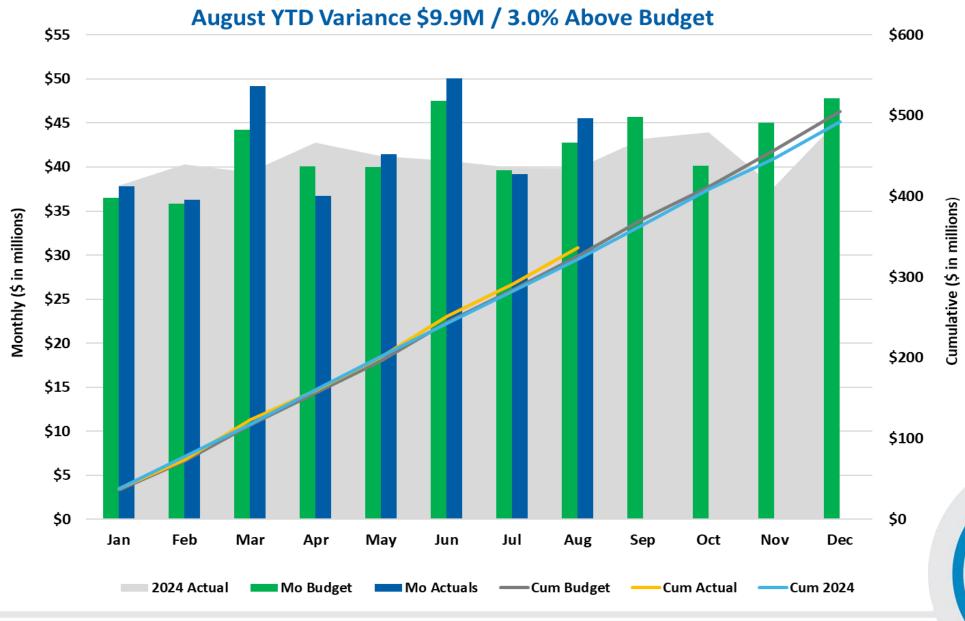

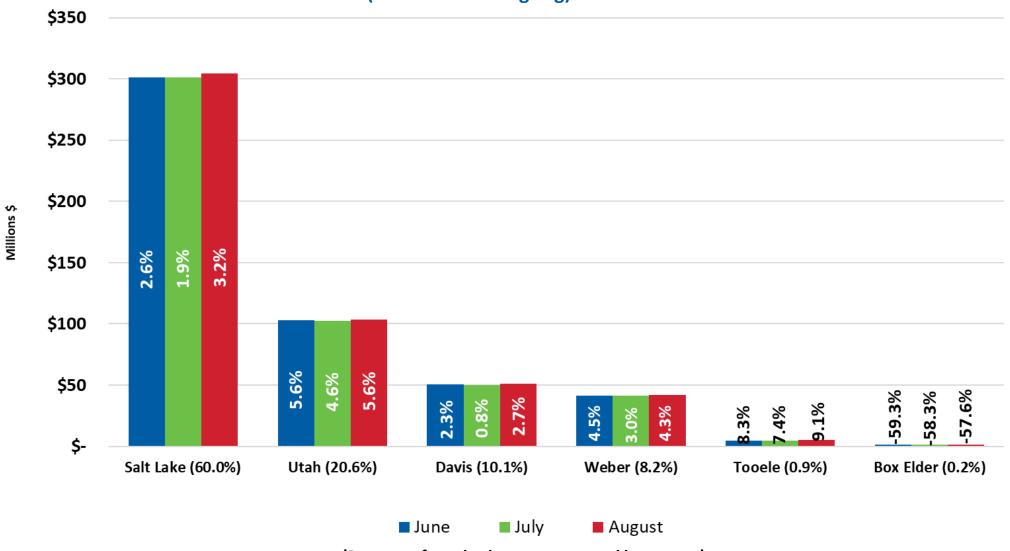

### Sales Tax Collections Percentage Change by month ended Aug 31, 2025

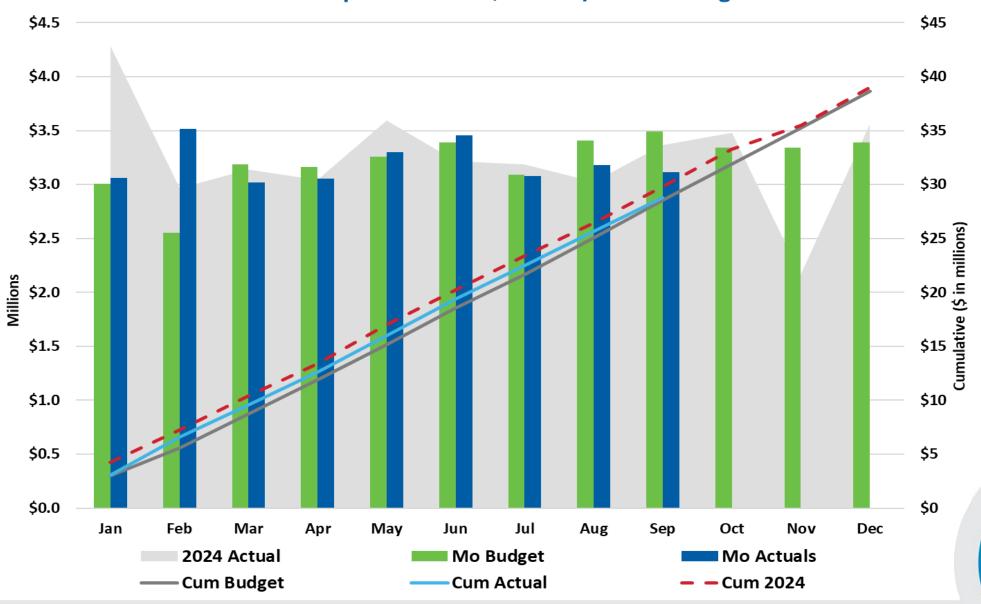

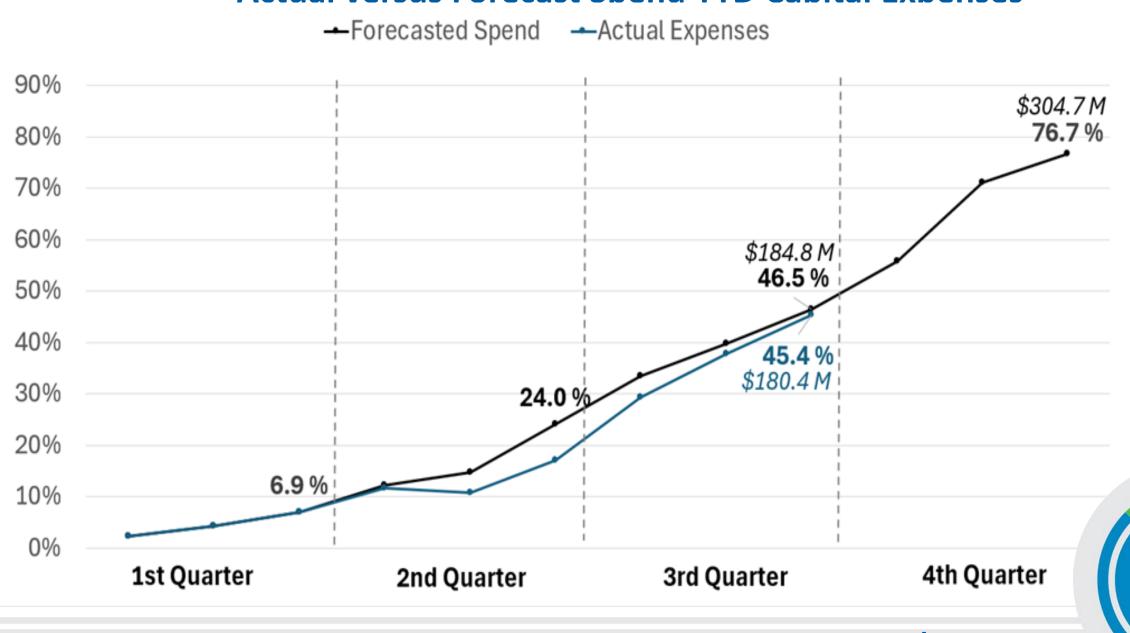

#### **Investment Review**

#### **Economic Summary Outlook**

- Inflation (Consumer Price Index) reported in August rose to 2.9% (year-over-year), increasing above the Federal Reserve's target (2.0%)
- The national labor market reported 4.3% in August reflects slight weakness between supply and demand
- U.S. Treasury yields continue decreasing from the 1 to 5 year maturities *inverted* yield curve
- Federal Reserve lowered Federal Funds target and anticipate additional rate cuts in 2025
  - Current Federal Funds Target: 4.00%-4.25%

#### **Investment Results**

Portfolio returns for 3Q 2025 was an average rate of 4.22% (annualized).



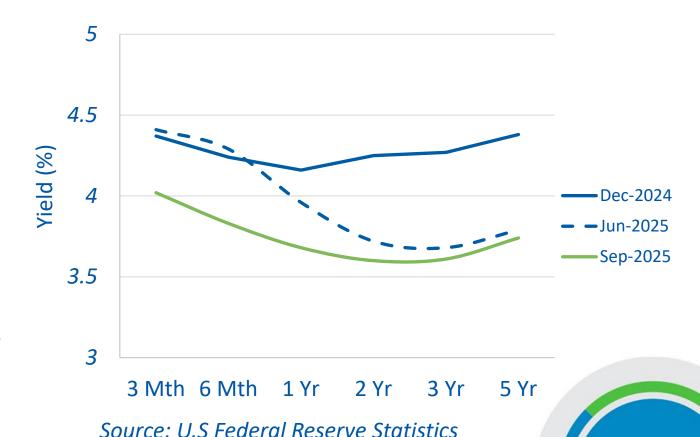
### **U. S. Treasury Yield Curve**

Beginning in **December 2024, the U.S. Treasury yield curve flattened** across maturities from 3 months to 5 years, indicating similar returns regardless of short-term investment length.

By June 2025, the curve had become inverted, meaning yields on 1- to 5-year bonds fell below those of shorter-term maturities (less than 1 year).

Following a recent cut in the Federal Funds target rate, the curve remains inverted but is now moving toward a flatter shape.

As a result, yields across the 5-year investment horizon are now closely aligned, offering similar returns regardless of maturity.

# R2025-11-02-Resolution Approving the Authority's 2026 Eco Pass Contracts Including the Eco Pass Fare Structure



### **BACKGROUND**

- The Public Transit District Act and Board Policy empower the Board of Trustees to approve contracts including reduced fares charged to riders.
- Board Policy allows the Board to preapprove contracts by resolution.
- Resolution R2023-11-01: Adopting the 2024 and 2025 Eco Pass Fare Structure of the Agency Expires December 31<sup>st</sup>, 2025
- Requesting to approve contract approvals and pricing for 2026
- Eco Pass Program
  - Designed to provide flexible, cost-effective transit benefits
  - For employers seeking to support sustainable commuting options for their workforce
  - Provides four options tailored to different organizational sizes and needs
  - Each pass type offers varying levels of commitment, pricing structures, and participation thresholds

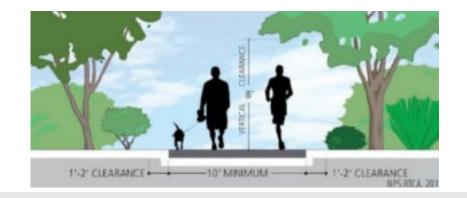


# R2025-11-03 - Resolution Authorizing Execution of an Interlocal Agreement with Box Elder County and Willard City Corporation for the Historic Orchard Pathway Corridor



# **Historic Orchard Pathway Overview**

- Passing through the iconic orchards and farmlands of southeastern Box Elder County, the Historic Orchard Pathway, or HOP, follows the former Utah Idaho Central Railway north from Weber County, linking South Willard, Willard, Perry and Brigham City.
  - This is a phase 1 project in Wasatch Front Regional Council's 2023 Regional Transportation Plan and is included in the Southeastern Box Elder County 2017 Active Transportation Plan.
- The Bear River Association of Governments (BRAG) obtained an Active Transportation Project Grant from the Utah Department of Transportation to fund the design and construction on a portion of this trail.





### **Utah Idaho Central Railroad Corridor**

- The Utah Idaho Central (UIC) Railroad corridor is an abandoned right of way that formerly provided train service between Ogden and Idaho.
- The UIC runs directly adjacent to Union Pacific's main line for about 2.75 miles (north of the Box Elder County line).
- UTA purchased this portion of the UIC from UDOT as part of corridor preservation efforts for a future transit line.
  - The UIC is 66 feet wide.
  - The eastern 16 feet of the corridor will be licensed for the Historic Orchard Pathway.

# **Historic Orchard Pathway Interlocal Agreement**

- An Active Transportation Project Grant has been secured by BRAG in the amount of \$6,000,000 through UDOT.
  - UTA will license, by separate license agreement, the eastern sixteen feet of UTA Property for the in-kind matching portion of this grant, and Willard City will contribute an easement upon City Property for the in-kind matching portion of this grant.
- Willard City and Box Elder County are the principal contracting entities for the design & construction.
  - UTA shall be consulted on trail designs relating to that portion to be built upon the UTA Licensed Area, which designs shall be subject to UTA review and approval.



# **Historic Orchard Pathway Interlocal Agreement**

- The City and County agree to maintain all trail improvements within each of their respective jurisdictions in a good and workmanlike manner.
- The City and County will also be responsible for performing enforcement and policing duties.

## **Affected Project Overview**

- FMA691 FuelMaster Installation at Meadowbrook and Mt Ogden: The installation of the fuel monitoring system UTA uses at most of its locations where fuel is dispensed. Meadowbrook and Mt Ogden receive the same system.
- ICI179 Network & Infrastructure Equipment: Replaces aging network equipment and software across our facilities and rail platforms to maintain reliable, secure, and high-performance connectivity. It also includes strategic expansion to support modern security standards, increased bandwidth demands, and integration with hybrid infrastructure environments.
- ICI213 eVoucher Phase 2: Upgrades and supports the current eVoucher program.
- ICI214 Init APC Upgrade: Replace INIT Automatic Passenger Counting system with Urban Transportation's system which is currently operating on our buses.

- MSP252 FrontRunner 2X: FrontRunner double tracking to increase peak hour service frequency.

## **Affected Project Overview - Continued**

- **REV224 Bus Overhaul:** Targets the replacement of engines and transmissions to extend the service life of the fleet to a 16-year useful life. This effort improves reliability, lowers long-term maintenance costs, and maximizes the return on investment for each vehicle.
- **REV236 VW Battery Bus:** Funding UTA received as part of the Volkswagen settlement. Includes bus purchases, chargers, and training

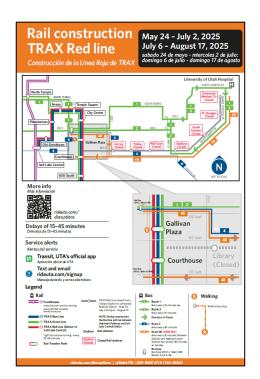
