Chair Carlton Christensen welcomed attendees and called the meeting to order at 9:01 a.m.

#### 2. Pledge of Allegiance

#### 4. Public Comment, Part 1

#### 5. Consent

- a. Approval of October 8, 2025, Board Meeting Minutes
- b. UTA Policy UTA.02.02 Contracting Authority Policy

It was noted that the October 8, 2025 minutes were modified from what was originally submitted to provide updated information on how to access video recordings of the meeting through the UTA website.

A motion was made by Trustee Acerson, and seconded by Chair Christensen, to approve the modified minutes and remainder of the consent agenda. The motion carried by a unanimous vote.

#### 6. Reports, Part 1

- a. Executive Director Report
  - UTA Recognition Bus Operations & Maintenance Roadeo Winners

Jay Fox, UTA Executive Director, was joined by Andres Colman, UTA Chief Operations

Officer, to recognize winners from the recent Roadeo.

#### 4. Public Comment, Part 2

#### 6. Reports, Part 2

#### b. Strategic Plan Minute: Building Community Support - Community Advocacy Plan

Jay Fox reported about key milestones completed so far in 2025. He also mentioned how the UTA social media presence has really grown. The number of followers has increased significantly.

#### c. Capital Program Report - Third Quarter 2025

Jared Scarbrough, UTA Acting Chief Capital Services Officer, was joined by Daniel Hofer, UTA Director of Capital Programming and Support, to give an update on the 2025 Capital Program through quarter three. Chair Christensen asked about updates to specific projects including the 5600 West vehicle procurement, grade crossing replacements, and bus stop construction. Staff answered accordingly.

#### 7. Resolutions

### a. R2025-10-04 - Resolution Granting 2025 Expenditure and Disbursement Authority to Non-Inventory Vendors

Robert Lamph, UTA Comptroller, and Eric Barrett, UTA Deputy Comptroller, requested the Board's authorization for an increase to the 2025 not-to-exceed amount for certain vendors. Discussion followed.

A motion was made by Trustee Acerson, and seconded by Chair Christensen, that this resolution be approved. The motion carried by the following vote:

#### 8. Contracts, Disbursements and Grants

### a. Change Order: Light Rail Vehicles Change Order 1 - Notice to Proceed in Exercising Option to Purchase 20 Vehicles (Stadler US)

Kyle Stockley, UTA Director of Capital Vehicles, explained the advantages of proceeding with purchasing 20 vehicles from Stadler US. There will be procurement savings from

exercising the option now. The contract amendment amount is \$121,511,694 which brings the total contract value to \$250,811,888.

A motion was made by Trustee Acerson, and seconded by Chair Christensen, that this change order be approved. The motion carried by a unanimous vote.

b. Change Order: Northern ADA Complementary Paratransit and Route Deviation Provider Services Modification 2 - Rate Modifications (MV Transportation, INC.)

Andres Colman, UTA Chief Operations Officer, and Ryan Taylor, UTA Special Services General Manager explained that this change order has been in negotiation for nearly two years. This reflects UTA's commitment to continuous improvement. Questions were asked about whether there is budget for this increase request. Discussion followed. The amendment amount is \$339,045, which brings the total contract value to \$25,373,599.

A motion was made by Trustee Acerson, and seconded by Chair Christensen, that this change order be approved. The motion carried by a unanimous vote.

c. Change Order: S-Line Extension Phase 1 Pre-Construction Design Services Change Order 4 - Systems and Pre-Curved Rail Procurement (Kiewit Infrastructure West Co.)

Jared Scarbrough described the project extending the streetcar line in Sugar House. To stay on schedule, the contractor, Kiewit will purchase equipment in UTA's name so it can be transferred to UTA should the agency decide to pursue a different contractor for construction, now that 90% of the design has been completed. The Board asked for an update on Highland Drive and Scarbrough committed to providing additional information on Salt Lake City's plans to reconstruct Highland Drive. The amendment amount is \$3,907,664.00 which brings the total contract value to \$8,923,166.11.

A motion was made by Trustee Acerson, and seconded by Chair Christensen, that this change order be approved. The motion carried by a unanimous vote.

d. Change Order: Federal External Relations - Administration - Modification 3 - Contract Extension (Cardinal Infrastructure, LLC)

Annette Royle, UTA Chief of Board Strategy and Governance, described the relationship between UTA and Cardinal Infrastructure, LLC, who provides government relations consulting services with federal agencies. To maintain consistency, a two-year extension to the contract with Cardinal was requested. The amendment amount is \$354,000 which brings the total contract value to \$1,146,000.

A motion was made by Trustee Acerson, and seconded by Chair Christensen, that this change order be approved. The motion carried by a unanimous vote.

e. Change Order: Federal External Relations - Congressional - Modification 3 - Contract Extension (Barker Leavitt, PLLC)

Annette Royle described the relationship between UTA and Barker Leavitt, PLLC who provides government relations consulting services with Utah's Congressional delegation. To maintain consistency, a two-year contract extension was requested. The amendment amount is \$323,535.12 which brings the total contract value to \$1,091,314.39

A motion was made by Trustee Acerson, and seconded by Chair Christensen, that this change order be approved. The motion carried by a unanimous vote.

#### 9. Discussion Items

#### a. UTA Policy - UTA.02.01 Spending Authority Policy

Viola Miller was joined by Todd Mills, UTA Director of Supply Chain, to discuss amendments to the UTA Spending Authority Policy, including increases to the allowed transaction limits. Discussion followed about increasing the micro-purchase and small-purchase limit and strategies to ensure optimal pricing. Staff commented that this process should improve efficiency and help reduce workload. The board asked about requirements to adhere to state and federal procurement policies.

### Appendix A In Person Public Comment

#### Melissa Clark:

Thank you, good evening. I'm Melissa Clark, I'm a member of the Eagle Mountain City Council. I'm here tonight because Eagle Mountain and the entire northwest corridor of Utah County is at a crossroads, and we need a strong partner in UTA. We are one of the fastest growing regions in the state, and in the nation. Eagle Mountain alone is adding more than 30 new residents, um, every other day, so combined between Eagle Mountain and Saratoga Springs, we're adding 30 every day.

In 2024, we issued over 1,500 building permits, more than any other city in Utah. We are doing our part to address the state's housing affordability crisis. And we're taking on the responsibility of long-term regional growth. But that kind of growth brings enormous pressure, and we cannot build our way out of this with roads alone.

Right now, our infrastructure is overwhelmed. SR-73 carries nearly 50,000 vehicles daily. Rated at a level of service of E. Pony Express Parkway sees nearly 40,000 vehicles daily, also, at level of service E, and still Eagle Mountain has no real transit service. We have a very, very limited bus twice a day. And that's why UTA's previous commitment to launch Route 860, a fixed-route bus to Eagle Mountain city center with 30-minute frequency starting in April of 2026 was so important. It acknowledged our need and gave, it gave our residents and planners something to build around. But in this proposed budget, that service has been removed. Let me be clear, pulling back on that promise to the fastest-growing city in the state sends the wrong message, not just to our residents, but to every community trying to grow responsibly.

At the same time, Eagle Mountain is leading in more than just housing. We're home to billions of dollars in commercial and industrial investment from companies like Meta, Tyson, Google, QTS Tract, and Annual Energy. That economic growth delivers real benefits to the state, thousands of high-paying jobs that grow Utah's income tax base, and infrastructure improvements, broadband, energy, water, that support broader regional systems.

Eagle Mountain is showing up. We've hosted UTA in our city, we've met with trustees and planners, and we've worked with Utah County and our neighbors to explore local funding options. We're not just asking for help. We're offering partnership. But partnership needs to be mutual. We're asking UTA to restore Route 860 to the 2026 budget and honor the April service commitment and stand with us as we build a regional transit system that keeps pace with growth.

Our city is ready, our residents ready. And now we need UTA to be ready, too.

Thank you for your time, and for your continued service to our region.

#### **Donna Burnham:**

Hi, I'm Donna Burnham, and I serve on the City Council of Eagle Mountain as well. And I'm also

petitioning you to, um, reinst... reinstate the Route 860.

I want to give you a little history of Eagle Mountain, because I know there's some concern about our low ridership numbers. Um, I've been on the council for 16 years. And when I was first on the council, we had standing room only on those buses because they were express buses to Salt Lake and to Orem. And literally our residents complained because they're, they were standing, and they were upset, that that was the complaint. Now we have very few people riding, because by the time it, um, my friend who rode the express bus quit riding because it took him twice as long to get to work going to the, the FrontRunner station, and then to work, then it did the express bus. And so, it became not worth it, but he's one of those people that has severe migraines, and sometimes his wife now has to go get him. um, whereas when he could do TRAX or FrontRunner, it was, it was accommodating for him.

We have a lot of people like that that need that kind of help. So, I would beg you not to just look at our ridership numbers and go, "Oh, they're not gonna ride the bus." They will. We will ride the bus, because it's getting to the point where our residents, that's all they talk about on our Facebook pages. Um, we're getting beat up all the time about the traffic. And one of the things that we really, really need is, um, a lane that's specific so that we could have a BRT-style transit, so that it would be faster. And we're willing to partner to make that happen. We want to work with you. We know what budgets are like. We get it. We have to deal with our city budget, and it's hard, because we need about 30 more employees than we have right now, and we can't hire them. So we get where you guys are at.

So, we're not trying to throw eggs at you or anything like that, um, but we are the fastest growing city in the state, and that's not going to stop anytime soon, and so we need your help. We're surrounded by mountains and then blocked off by a lake. You're never going to be able to build enough roads. So we need transit, or we're not going to be able to function as a city. So I hope that you'll reconsider. Thank you.

#### **Charlotte Ducos:**

Hi, my name is Charlotte Ducos. I'm also from Eagle Mountain. I am currently a resident running for city council and wanted to come and speak tonight.

I, uh, by day, am a schoolteacher. I teach at the high school, and so my, the people I spend my day with are young people. And as we got on the train to come here tonight, who got off the train? But that, that group of individuals that, that I teach. And we have a lot of our students out in Eagle Mountain that travel down to MTECH to take classes, and they're clogging up our streets, even in the middle of the day. They have expressed that they would love to be able to ride transit but don't have that option available to them. So in every 30 minutes, all day long, would have ridership from our young people if it came down specifically to that Thanksgiving Point Lehi Station, because right there, they get off. They've got their MTECH, um, right there. And so that would take trips off the road, and it would also provide ridership for that all-day long um, route.

I've also met with senior citizens in our community who have indicated that having a route

that would get them to shopping areas and things like that would be very, very helpful to them, because driving, obviously, is a difficulty for them. And so, having something that is reliable, and they know what time they can go and catch it, would be very helpful to them as well.

We're a growing community. Uh, Melissa did an amazing job of sharing with you all kinds of statistics about that. 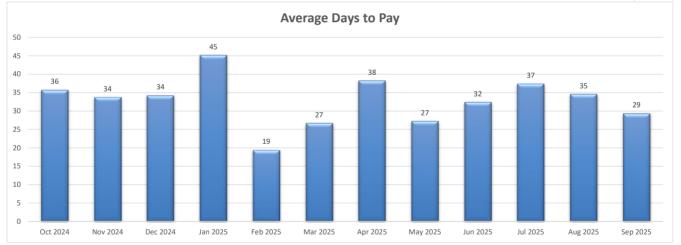

#### **BACKGROUND:**

The Board of Trustees Policy No. 2.1, Financial Management, authorizes the Treasurer to manage the investment of all non-retirement Authority funds in compliance with applicable laws and requires the Chief Financial Officer to prepare and present to the Board a summary of investments, investment activity, and investment performance compared to benchmarks as soon as practical after the end of each calendar quarter. The investment report has been prepared in accordance with the Financial Management Policy and is being presented to the Board.

#### **DISCUSSION:**

As of September 30, 2025, the benchmark return (greater of the average return of three-month U.S. Treasury bills or the average return of Federal Funds rate) was 4.29% for the quarter. Investment returns for the State of Utah's Public Treasurer's Investment Fund (PTIF) and Zions Corporate Trust was 4.48%, which exceeded the benchmark return. Investment returns for Chandler Asset Management were 3.91% and the overnight account at Zions Bank was 3.70%, these did not exceed the benchmark return.

The blended portfolio return rate for the quarter was 4.22%, which was slightly below the benchmark rate due

to long term investment strategy and the increased interest rate environment for the short end of the yield curve.

Note, all returns are reported on an annualized basis.

All investments are in accordance with the Utah State Money Management Act, Section 51, Chapter 7, Utah Code annotated.

#### **ALTERNATIVES:**

Utah Transit Authority could increase investments in the Chandler Investment Portfolio and extend the overall duration to potentially seek higher returns. However, that strategy would forego the current advantages of the shorter duration and higher return portfolios like PTIF. Additionally, it would increase the liquidity risk by extending the portfolio duration, which is contrary to the Corporate Policy No. 3.1.4 Investments.

#### **FISCAL IMPACT:**

Investment earnings for UTA in the third quarter of 2025 were \$4,192,804.

#### **BACKGROUND:**

The Utah Public Transit District Act 17B-2a-808.1(2)(s) and UTA Board Policy 4.1 Fares require that the Board of Trustees review and approve contracts pertaining to reduced fares. In 2023, the UTA Board of Trustees approved Resolution R2023-11-01 adopting the 2024 and 2025 Eco Pass Fare Structure. This resolution expires on December 31, 2025, and a new resolution will be required before staff can renew contracts with partners for 2026.

The UTA Eco Pass Program enables businesses and organizations to purchase discounted transit passes for employees, with options designed to meet the needs of varying organizational sizes.

The Eco Pass Program is designed to encourage transit ridership, reduce traffic congestion, and improve air quality, while also giving employers a cost-effective way to provide transit benefits and utilize pre-tax payroll deductions.

#### **DISCUSSION:**

Monica Howe will present the resolution for the Board's approval. No changes will be made to the prior

resolution's rates which are listed in the table below. Passes purchased through the Eco Pass Program are valid on all services except Ski-bus and Paratransit services.

- 1. That the form of the 2026 Eco Pass Contract including the Eco Pass reduced fare structure is hereby approved in substantially the same form as attached as Exhibit A (Eco Pass Standard Agreement).
- 2. That any Eco Pass Agreement substantially following the form of agreement contained in Exhibit A of the resolution shall be considered to have been approved by the Board.
- 3. ### **ECO PASS AGREEMENT**

2026

This Eco Pass Agreement ("Agreement") is made effective the 1	st day of, 2026
(the "Effective Date") by and between,	, the ("Administrator") and
UTAH TRANSIT AUTHORITY ("UTA"), a public transit dis	strict, whose address is 669 Wes
200 South, Salt Lake City, Utah 84101.	

#### RECITALS

WHEREAS, UTA is a public transit district providing public transit services within the State of Utah;

WHEREAS, Administrator is an entity that hires employees who work within geographic area served by UTA;

WHEREAS, both Administrator and UTA recognize the benefits of public transit for individuals, businesses and the community for reducing congestion, improving the quality of air and the environment and limiting the amount of real property set aside or dedicated to motor vehicle uses and parking in urban locations;

WHEREAS, UTA has implemented an "ECO Pass Program" or economical transit pass program whereby employers agree to purchase from UTA transit passes for employees at discounted rates; and

WHEREAS, Administrator desires to participate in UTA's ECO Pass program pursuant to the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement.

NOW THEREFORE, Administrator and UTA hereby covenant and agree to be bound by the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement, including Exhibit "A" – Pass Program Account Setup and Exhibit "B" – Pass Program Guidelines and Rules, attached hereto and made a part hereof by this reference.

#### **DEFINITIONS**

- **1.1.** The term "Authorized Services" means travel on local buses, express buses, TRAX light rail, Streetcar light rail, bus rapid transit, and FrontRunner commuter rail. Authorized Services do not include travel on Ski-bus, or Paratransit services.
- **1.2.** The term "Authorized User" means Administrator's employees who have been issued a Pass in compliance with this Agreement.
- **1.3.** The term "Pass" means a card issued by Administrator to an Authorized User under the terms of this Agreement for use on UTA's transit system.
- 1.4. The term "Qualified Employee" means (a) an employee who is employed on a full-time,

part-time, seasonal, and/or temporary basis; (b) an employee who is not currently participating in a UTA van pool program; (c) an employee who works shifts when UTA is providing transit services.

#### TERMS AND CONDITIONS

- **2.1. TERM.** This Agreement shall be in effect from Effective Date through December 31, 2026
- **2.2. FORM OF PASSES.** Administrator shall issue electronic fare cards imbedded with microchips that are individually numbered on the outside with a unique internal identification number and signature strip for use as Passes. Cards must either be provided or approved by UTA.
- **2.3. NON-TRANSFERRABLE.** A Pass is not transferable.

#### **2.4.** MINIMUM NUMBER OF PASSES.

- 2.4.1. **Annual Preferred Passes.** An Administrator that purchases Annual Preferred Passes shall purchase an Annual Preferred Pass for each Qualified Employee. An Administrator must have one-hundred (100) or more Qualified Employees to participate in this program.
- 2.4.2. **Annual Select Passes.** An Administrator that purchases Annual Select Passes shall purchase a minimum of thirty (30) Annual Select Passes.
- 2.4.3. **Monthly Passes.** An Administrator that purchases Monthly Passes shall purchase a minimum of ten (10) Monthly Passes.
- 2.4.4. **Daily Passes.** An Administrator that purchases Daily Passes shall purchase at least \$500 worth of Daily Passes each month.
- 2.4.5. **Paratransit Passes.** If Administrator provides subsidized Passes to Authorized Users, Administrator agrees to purchase similarly subsidized paratransit passes for travel to and from the Authorized User's place of employment for any Authorized User who is Paratransit eligible and cannot ride UTA's fixed route services.
- **2.5. ISSUING PASSES.** Administrator is responsible for issuing Passes. Administrator shall not issue a Pass to any person who is not an Authorized User under this Agreement. Prior to issuing a Pass, Administrator shall confirm the recipient qualifies as an Authorized User; print the recipient's name on the Pass in permanent ink, unless the Pass is owned by Administrator with no signature strip; and record the recipient's name and corresponding Pass number.

#### 2.6. ACTIVATING PASSES.

2.6.1. **Annual and Daily Passes**. Upon execution of this Agreement, UTA will provide Administrator with activated Passes based on the preferred start month identified in Exhibit "A", Section 5. All Passes automatically expire December 31st but may be activated for another year upon completion of a subsequent agreement between the

- parties prior to the expiration of the Passes.
- 2.6.2. **Monthly Passes.** UTA will provide Administrator with inactive Passes that Administrator shall activate. To activate Passes for use on the 1<sup>st</sup> day of the month, Administrator shall provide UTA with an electronic file of Pass numbers that conforms to the Bulk Import File Specifications Guide provided by UTA no earlier than the 25<sup>th</sup> of the month and no later than the second to last business day of the month. Administrator may activate Passes at any time during the month, but UTA will not prorate the monthly charge for late activations.
- **2.7. PAYMENT FOR PASSES.** Administrator shall pay the amount stated on Exhibit "A" for Passes provided by UTA under this Agreement. Administrator is responsible for paying the full amount owed to UTA, regardless of whether Administrator receives payment for Passes from a third party. Administrator shall pay the amount invoiced by the due dates identified below. UTA shall charge Administrator a one percent (1%) per month late fee on balances due under this Agreement that remain unpaid forty-five (45) days from date of invoice.
  - 2.7.1. **Annual Passes.** UTA shall issue Administrator an invoice for the annual amount to be paid under this Agreement within fifteen (15) days of the Effective Date. In addition to the penalties set forth in Section 2.7, UTA shall deactivate all active Passes in the event Administrator has a balance due under this Agreement that remains unpaid for forty- five (45) days from the Effective Date.
  - 2.7.2. **Monthly Passes.** UTA shall issue Administrator an invoice at the end of each month for all Passes activated during the month or a minimum of ten (10) Passes, whichever is greater. Payment is due by the 15<sup>th</sup> day of the month following the month in which the passes were activated. In addition to the penalties set forth in Section 2.7, UTA shall suspend Administrator's ability to activate Passes in the event Administrator has a balance due under this Agreement that remains unpaid for forty-five (45) days from the date of the original invoice.
  - 2.7.3. **Daily Passes.** UTA shall issue Administrator an invoice for actual daily Pass usage each month within five days after the month ends. Administrator shall pay UTA the amount of \$500.00 or the value of the actual daily Pass use, whichever is greater, within thirty (30) days of the date of the invoice. In addition to the penalties set forth in Section 2.7, UTA shall suspend Administrator's ability to activate Passes and shall deactivate all active Passes in the event Administrator has a balance due under this Agreement that remains unpaid for forty-five (45) days from the date of the original invoice.
- 2.8. PURCHASE OF ADDITIONAL PASSES. Administrator may purchase additional Passes by making a request through https://ecopass.rideuta.com. UTA shall charge Administrator a prorated price for additional annual Passes based on the number of months remaining under this Agreement and will issue an invoice for the purchase of the additional Passes.
- **2.9. ISSUING REPLACEMENT PASSES.** Administrator is responsible for replacing Passes that are lost, stolen, defective, or otherwise require replacement. Administrator must process

- all Pass replacements on UTA's partner website www.tap2rideuta.com.
- **2.10. COST OF REPLACEMENT PASSES TO ADMINISTRATOR.** UTA will not charge Administrator for electronic Passes so long as the number of Passes requested does not exceed more than 50% of the number of passes indicated on Exhibit "A." In the event Administrator exceeds the number of passes, Administrator agrees to pay \$3.00 for each additional Pass provided by UTA.
- **2.11. COST OF REPLACEMENT PASSES TO AUTHORIZED USERS.** Administrator may charge an Authorized User for a replacement Pass in an amount less than or equal to the amount paid by Administrator to UTA for the replacement Pass. However, at its discretion, Administrator may charge an Authorized User a fee for the administrative costs associated with reissuing a Pass.
- **2.12. RESTRICTIONS ON CHARGES TO AUTHORIZED USERS.** Administrator may collect all, or part of, its' cost for each Pass from the Authorized User as long as the amount collected does not exceed the cost per Pass charged to Administrator under this Agreement. Upon the request of UTA, Administrator shall submit an accounting detailing the number of Passes sold, and the amounts paid by Authorized Users for Passes.
- **2.13. SECURITY TERMS.** Administrator agrees to be responsible for all Passes delivered to Administrator by UTA and to treat unissued Passes with the same care and safeguards as it treats cash. Administrator shall notify UTA of any theft of unissued Passes within three (3) business days of the theft. Administrator agrees to pay any fares associated with the use of the unissued, stolen Passes if it fails to notify UTA within three (3) business days of the theft.
- **2.14. DEACTIVATING PASSES.** Administrator shall deactivate a Pass within three business days if a person issued a Pass is no longer an Authorized User or if a Pass is lost or stolen.
- **2.15. CONFISCATION OF PASSES.** UTA shall have the right to confiscate a Pass at any time (without notice to the Administrator) from any person who UTA reasonably believes is not an Authorized User or if UTA reasonably believes the Pass has been duplicated, altered, or used in an unauthorized way. UTA will immediately deactivate confiscated Passes and notify Administrator. If the Pass is an Administrator-provided card, UTA will return it to Administrator.
- 2.16. GUARANTEED RIDE HOME. To accommodate a Bona Fide Emergency affecting one of Administrator's Authorized Users, UTA agrees that during the Term of this Agreement it will provide a guaranteed ride home for Administrator's Authorized Users who cannot take their customary scheduled transit trip or another reasonably scheduled transit trip from work to home because of an Emergency. UTA agrees that, in the event of Emergency, UTA, at its expense, will provide alternative transportation to Administrator's Authorized Users from Administrator's business locations to the Authorized User's home or other location within the boundaries of the public transit district where the Immediate Family Member requiring the Emergency help is located. UTA agrees that the guaranteed ride home will be undertaken, at UTA's option, in one of the following two alternative ways: (1) a ride in a UTA vehicle driven by a UTA employee; or (2) a ride in a taxicab. An Administrator's Authorized User

shall be entitled up to six (6) guaranteed rides home in any calendar year.

- 2.16.1 For purposes of this Agreement, the term "Bona Fide Emergency" means: (a) an unavoidable and unplanned change in the Authorized User's work schedule which causes the Authorized User to miss the Authorized User's usual or customary scheduled transit trip from work to home and another transit trip is not scheduled within a thirty minute time period; or (b) the illness or injury of the Authorized User or the Authorized User's Immediate Family Member which requires the Authorized User to immediately leave work to attend to the needs of the Authorized User or an Immediate Family Member and where another regularly scheduled transit trips will not permit the Authorized User to reasonably meet such needs. Administrator shall provide a statement signed Administrators pass Program Manager attesting to the bona fide nature of the emergency based on the criteria described above within 5 business days after the ride is provided. If such a signed statement is not received within the required period, UTA shall bill Administrator for the cost of the additional transportation provided and Administrator shall reimburse UTA for such service.
- 2.16.2 For purposes of this Agreement, the term "Immediate Family Member" means a spouse, child, stepchild of the Authorized User, or other person who resides in the same residence as the Authorized User and is the dependent of the Authorized User
- **2.17 TERMINATION.** This Agreement shall continue in full force and effect during the term of this Agreement unless it is terminated earlier by either party. Each party may terminate this Agreement in its sole discretion by giving the other party written notice of termination at least thirty (30) days prior to the termination date. No refunds will be issued for Daily, Monthly, or Annual Passes.
- **2.18 RETURN OF UNUSED PASSES**. In the event this Agreement is terminated, and Administrator does not enter into a subsequent agreement with UTA in which it continues to be responsible for issuing Passes, Administrator shall return all unused Passes to UTA within fifteen (15) days of the termination of this Agreement.
- **2.19 RECORD KEEPING.** Administrator is required to maintain the following records for its employees: the Pass number of each issued Pass, including replacement Passes; the name of the person issued each Pass; and the Pass number of each unissued Pass. UTA maintains the right, upon reasonable notice, to always inspect Pass issuance records during regular business hours during the term of this Agreement and for a period of one year after the expiration or termination of this Agreement.

### **MISCELLANEOUS**

- **3.1 THIRD PARTY INTERESTS.** Except as for the rights provided to Authorized Users, no person not a party to this Agreement shall have any rights or entitlements of any nature under it.
- **3.2 ENTIRE AGREEMENT.** This Agreement and the Exhibits attached hereto contain the entire agreement between the parties hereto for the term stated and cannot be modified

- except by written agreement signed by both parties. Neither party shall be bound by any oral agreement or special arrangements contrary to or in addition to the terms and condition as stated herein.
- **3.3 COSTS AND ATTORNEY'S FEES.** If any party to this Agreement brings an action to enforce or defend its rights or obligations hereunder, the prevailing party shall be entitled to recover its costs and expenses, including mediation, arbitration, litigation, court costs and attorneys' fees, if any, incurred in connection with such suit, including on appeal.
- 3.4 NOTICES. All legal notices to be given hereunder shall be sufficient if given in writing in person or by electronic mail. All notices shall be addressed to the respective party at its address shown below or at such other address or addresses as each may hereafter designate in writing. Notices shall be deemed effective and complete at the time of receipt, provided that the refusal to accept delivery shall be construed as receipt for purposes of this Agreement. Either party may change the address at which such party desires to receive written notice by giving written notice of such change to the other party. Any such notice shall be deemed to have been given, and shall be effective, on delivery to the notice address then applicable for the party to which the notice is directed, provided, however, that refusal to accept delivery of a notice or the inability to deliver a notice because of an address change which was not properly communicated shall not defeat or delay the giving of a notice.

- **3.5 INTENT TO BE LEGALLY BOUND.** The undersigned parties have duly caused this Agreement to be executed and any individual signatories executing on behalf of the parties are duly authorized by his or her respective party to execute this Agreement.
- 3.6 NON-DISCRIMINATION. Administrator agrees that it shall not exclude any individual from participation in or deny any individual the benefits of this Agreement, on the basis of race, color, national origin, disability, sex, or age in accordance with the requirements of 49 U.S.C. 5332 and the Utah Antidiscrimination Act (UCA 34A-5-101).
- **3.7 DEFAULT.** In the event that either party fails to perform any of the terms and conditions required to be performed pursuant to this Agreement, and upon fifteen (15) days' notice of such failure to perform, the non- defaulting party under this Agreement may terminate this Agreement. If Administrator fails to pay UTA, nothing herein shall prevent UTA from recovering the amount of the Purchase Price, including court costs and reasonable attorney's

- fees after the Agreement has been terminated.
- **3.8 SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS.** This Agreement shall not be assigned without the written consent of the other party. This Agreement with all of its terms and provisions shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of any permitted successors and assigns of the Parties hereto.
- **3.9 AMENDMENTS.** This Agreement may not be modified or terminated orally, and no claimed modification, rescission or waiver shall be binding upon either party unless in writing signed by a duly authorized representative of each party.
- 3.10 INDEMINFICATION. Each party hereby agrees to be responsible and assume liability for its own negligent or wrongful acts or omissions or those of its officers, agents or employees to the full extent required by law and agrees to indemnify and hold the other party harmless from any such liability, damage, expense, cause of action, suit, claim, judgment, or other action arising from participation in this Agreement. The Parties recognize and acknowledge that UTA is a public or governmental agency or entity covered under the provisions of the Utah Governmental Immunity Act as set forth in Sections 63-30-1 to 63-30-38, Utah Code Annotated 1953, as amended, and the limits of liability therein described. Neither party waives any legal defenses or benefits available to them under applicable law, and both agree to cooperate in good faith in resolving any disputes that may arise under this Agreement.
- **3.11 GOVERNING LAW.** This Agreement and all transactions contemplated hereunder and/or evidenced hereby shall be governed by and construed under and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of Utah without giving effect to any choice of law or conflict of law rules or provisions.
- **3.12 WAIVER.** The waiver by either party of any of the covenants as contained in this Agreement shall not be deemed a waiver of such party's rights to enforce the same or any other covenant herein, and the rights and remedies of the parties hereunder shall be in addition to, and not in lieu of, any right or remedy as provided by law.

#### Exhibit B

Pass Program Guidelines and Rules

#### TRANSIT COORDINATOR

Administrator must designate a Transit Coordinator ("TC") that will oversee the pass program administration. The TC will be trained by UTA staff on how to use the UTA Partner Web Site where card management functions are to be performed. TC's are responsible for training staff how to issue, activate, deactivate, and replace cards.

#### PROCUREMENT OF PASSES

To request cards, send an email to <u>passprograms@rideuta.com</u> and indicate the quantity of cards and the date needed by.

Administrator can elect to provide their own cards if the intent is to integrate electronic contactless technology into a picture identification card or building access badge. Administrator should work closely with UTA to ensure that the cards are compliant with the UTA card data format specification. For a copy of the format specification contact your account representative.

#### **ISSUANCE OF PASSES**

Administrator is responsible for issuing cards and is responsible to complete the following upon issuance:

- Confirm the recipient qualifies under this agreement
- Print the recipient's name on the card in permanent ink, unless card is owned by Administrator with no signature strip
- Ensure that recipients understand how to use cards as fare media in accordance with UTA's rules for electronic fare collection: tap when boarding and exiting a bus; tap when entering and exiting a TRAX platform; tap when entering and exiting a FrontRunner; do not share the card with another rider.
- Record the recipient name and the card number issued to them (see record keeping below)

#### RECORD KEEPING

Administrator is required to maintain the following card issuance records:

- The card number of each issued card, including replacement cards, and the corresponding person issued such pass
- The card number of each unissued card

## REQUESTS FOR ELECTRONIC TAP DATA

According to Utah Code 17B-2a-815(3)(a), UTA can only provide limited tap data to administrators. To access reports currently available go to UTA's partner website at <a href="www.tap2rideuta.com">www.tap2rideuta.com</a> and click on reports. If you need data not provided on the partner website email <a href="mailto:passprograms@rideuta.com">passprograms@rideuta.com</a> with your request and someone will contact you.

#### COST OF PASSES

UTA will provide electronic cards to pass program participants at no charge. If Administrator and UTA determine a card cost is necessary, it will not exceed \$3.00 per card which may be passed

onto the cardholder.

#### **RETURN OF UNUSED CARDS**

Unused cards should be returned, and UTA may demand the return of, if this agreement is terminated.

#### **CUSTOMER SERVICE**

TC's are supported by UTA's Product Development and Sales team and are assigned specific account representatives to assist as needed. TC's are expected to be the primary contact for cardholders. If a cardholder experiences card-related issues and contacts UTA's customer service team, they will be directed back to the TC for assistance. UTA's customer service team can assist and help cardholders with issues such as basic trouble shooting and answering questions about riding UTA service.

#### **CARD REPLACEMENTS**

Electronic cards are meant to be retained by the cardholder and reused. Administrator is responsible for replacing cards that are lost, stolen, defective, or otherwise require replacement. All card replacements must be done using the 'replace card' functionality on UTA's partner website at <a href="https://www.tap2rideuta.com">www.tap2rideuta.com</a>. For more information on how to replace a card refer to the UTA Partner Web Site User Guide provided during training.

#### **TAPPING**

Administrator is responsible for ensuring that cardholders are made aware of UTA's requirement to "tap-on" and "tap-off" at designated readers when riding UTA services. Failure to do so may result in a citation or fine to the cardholder pursuant to UTA Ordinances.

#### **CARD CARE**

It is important to protect the cards from damage. The card will not work if sensitive wires inside are broken. Do not punch holes, bend, keep in excessive heat or do anything to the card that could damage it. For the card to be read properly on electronic card readers do not have your card against other plastic cards, metal objects or electronic devices. Otherwise, it will interfere with the card signal causing the card not to be read or to be read improperly.

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

Approve Resolution R2025-11-03 to authorize the Interlocal Agreement with Willard City Cooperation and Box Elder County for the development and operation of a trail on the Historic Orchard Pathway Corridor.

#### **BACKGROUND:**

UTA purchased a portion of the abandoned Utah Idaho Central (UIC) Railroad as part of corridor preservation efforts in Box Elder County. This is a 66-foot-wide alignment which extends from 8700 South to approximately 6800 South in Box Elder County. The Regional Transportation Plan identifies the need for a trail within this corridor. The Bear River Association of Governments has applied for and obtained an Active Transportation Project Grant from the Utah Department of Transportation to fund the design and construction of the Trail on the UTA Property and the Willard Property.

#### **DISCUSSION:**

This resolution seeks approval of an interlocal agreement between UTA, Willard City, and Box Elder County (UTA contract #25-P00520) which details the roles and responsibilities of each party in the trail project. The ILA anticipates the execution of an agreement to license the eastern sixteen feet (16') of the UTA Property to the City and County for use as a public trail. The value of the license will be treated as an in-kind contribution towards the matching portion of UDOT Active Transportation Project Grant funding, which will be used in the design and construction of the Trail. This maintains a 50-foot corridor for future transit service.

The trail will be a paved, non-motorized corridor located on the UTA Licensed Area and the City property, between 8700 South Box Elder County, north to approximately 6800 South, at which point the Trail will diverge and run along 200 West in Willard City north to 800 North in Willard City. The City and County agree to maintain all trail improvements within each of their respective jurisdictions. The term of the agreement extends 25 years from the date of execution and renews automatically for an additional 25 years. Provisions for UTA to terminate the agreement as needed for other transit use of the property are included in the agreement.

#### **ALTERNATIVES:**

If UTA chooses not to enter into this interlocal agreement, the City and County would have to look for an alternative alignment for the Historic Orchard Pathway.

#### **FISCAL IMPACT:**

Licensing of the land, which UTA purchased previously, will be provided as an in-kind contribution towards the matching portion of UDOT Active Transportation Project Grant funding. The appraised value of the UTA property license to be contributed is \$381,700. UTA is not providing any additional funding for this project.

WHEREAS, this agreement allows for the creation of a joint cooperative project to design, finance, construct, install, operate and maintain a public trail on property owned by the Authority; and

WHEREAS, the Board of the Authority recognizes the mutual advantage of this agreement, and desires to, in accordance with the Utah Interlocal Cooperation Agreement Act, approve and authorize the execution of an ILA with Box Elder County and Willard City Corporation for the development and operation of trails on the Historic Orchard Pathway Corridor.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board:

- 1. That the Board hereby approves the Interlocal Cooperation Agreement with Box Elder County and Willard City Corporation in substantially the same form as attached as Exhibit A.
- 2. That the Executive Director is authorized to execute the Interlocal Cooperation Agreement with Box Elder County and Willard City Corporation in substantially the same form as attached as Exhibit A.
- 3. That the Board hereby ratifies any and all actions previously taken by the Authority's management, staff, and counsel related to negotiating and

### OPERATION OF A TRAILS PROJECT ON THE UTA-OWNED HISTORIC ORCHARD PATHWAY CORRIDOR

This Interlocal Agreement (the "Agreement") regarding the development and operation
of a Trails Project on the Historic Orchard Pathway Corridor (the "HOP Corridor") is entered
into as of the day of, 2025 by and between UTAH TRANSIT AUTHORITY
a large public transit district organized under the laws of the State of Utah ("UTA"), WILLARD
CITY CORPORATION, a municipal corporation organized under the laws of the State of Utah
(the "City"), and BOX ELDER COUNTY, a municipal corporation organized under the laws of
the State of Utah (the "County"). UTA, City, and County are hereafter sometimes collectively
referred to as "parties," and either may be referred to individually as "party," all as governed to
the context in which such words are used.

#### **RECITALS**

WHEREAS, UTA owns a portion of the HOP Corridor (hereinafter referred to as the "UTA Property") from approximately 8700 South in Box Elder County to approximately 6800 South in Box Elder County, and desires to support the development of the Historic Orchard Pathway trail ("Trail") to facilitate future transit connectivity; and

WHEREAS, City owns property along 200 West in Willard City (hereinafter referred to as "Willard Property"); and

WHEREAS, City and County desire to develop the public Trail within each of their jurisdictions, which will be utilized by and benefit the residents of each of their respective jurisdictions; and

WHEREAS, UTA, City, and County have agreed to cooperate in the finance, design, construction, and delivery of the Trail on the UTA Property and the Willard Property, which will be installed, operated and maintained by City and County pursuant to the terms and conditions set forth in this Interlocal Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the Bear River Association of Governments ("BRAG") has applied for and obtained an Active Transportation Project Grant from the Utah Department of Transportation ("UDOT") to fund the design and construction of the Trail on the UTA Property and the Willard Property, and this grant requires matching funds to be contributed towards the development of the Trail; and

WHEREAS, UTA is willing to license the eastern sixteen feet (16') of the UTA Property (hereinafter referred to as the "UTA Licensed Area") to the City and County for use as a public trail, and that the value of said license be treated as an in-kind contribution towards the

matching portion of UDOT Active Transportation Project Grant funding, which will be used in the design and construction of the Trail; and

WHEREAS, City is willing to contribute property along 200 West towards the matching portion of UDOT Active Transportation Project Grant funding which will be used in the design and construction of the Trail; and

WHEREAS, the parties desire to set forth their respective duties and responsibilities pursuant to this Interlocal Agreement.

NOW, THEREFORE, based upon the above Recitals and the consideration set forth herein, the receipt and sufficiency of which the parties acknowledge, it is hereby agreed as follows:

- 1. <u>Purpose of Agreement</u>. The parties are cooperating in a joint project to finance, design, construct, install, operate and maintain a public trail (the "Trail") on a portion of the HOP Corridor consisting of real property licensed by UTA, which is more specifically described in Exhibit "A" attached hereto (hereinafter referred to as the "UTA Licensed Area") and real property owned by City, which is more specifically described in Exhibit "B" attached hereto (hereinafter referred to as the "City Property").
- a. The Trail will be a paved, non-motorized corridor located on the UTA Licensed Area and the City Property, between 8700 South Box Elder County, north to approximately 6800 South, at which point the Trail will diverge and run along 200 West in Willard City north to 800 North in Willard City, as more particularly described in Exhibit "C" attached hereto (hereinafter referred to as the "Trail Alignment").
- b. An Active Transportation Project Grant through UDOT has been secured by the Bear River Association of Governments ("BRAG") to design and construct the Trail. UDOT, City, and County will separately enter into a State Aid Agreement specifying the respective roles in administering the grant and other monies, and designing and constructing the Trail, which will be coordinated with UTA.
- 2. <u>Portions of Trail within City</u>. That portion of the Trail to be constructed within the jurisdictional limits of City on the City Property is approximately 2.5 miles long and extends from 800 North along 200 West, Willard, south to approximately 1100 South, Willard. This is a part of a larger project intended to extend the Trail the full length of the HOP Corridor. Upon completion of construction, City will assume sole responsibility to operate and maintain those portions of the Trail located within its jurisdictional limits. City will not have responsibility with respect to any portions of the Trail that are not constructed within the jurisdictional limits of City.
  - 3. Portions of Trail within County. That portion of the Trail to be constructed within

the jurisdictional limits of County on the UTA Licensed Area is approximately 2.5 miles long and extends from approximately 6800 South to 8700 South along the Union Pacific railroad within the eastern sixteen feet (16') of the UTA right-of-way. This is a part of a larger project intended to extend the Trail the full length of the HOP Corridor. Upon completion of construction, County will assume sole responsibility to operate and maintain those portions of the Trail located within its jurisdictional limits of the County. The County will not have responsibility with respect to any portions of the Trail that are not constructed within the jurisdictional limits of the County.

- 4. <u>Scope of use for Trail</u>. The Trail will be open to the public for pedestrians, bicyclists, and similar non-motorized uses, including an equestrian component. All parties shall have the right to review and retain the right to terminate the scope of use(s) on those portions owned by the respective parties by delivering a 60-day written notice to the other parties.
- 5. Grant for Trail Design and Construction. In order to design, construct and install the Trail, an Active Transportation Project Grant has been secured by BRAG in the amount of \$6,000,000 through the Utah Department of Transportation ("UDOT"). UTA will license, by separate license agreement, the eastern sixteen feet (16') of UTA Property for the in-kind matching portion of this grant and the City will contribute an easement upon City Property for the in-kind matching portion of this grant. UTA and City will be responsible for complying with any federal, state or local grant requirements. The disbursement of the funds from the Active Transportation Project Grant will be by UDOT. In the event the Active Transportation Project Grant is insufficient for the design, construction, and installation of the Trail, the City shall not be required to provide any further in-kind, cash, or other contributions for the completion of the Trail without the City's expressed written consent.
- 6. <u>Design Review</u>. City and County are the principal contracting entities with respect to the design consultant retained to perform design and engineering work for the Trail. Accordingly, City and County shall retain the design consultant and coordinate the design and approval of the final design of the Trail by the design consultant. UTA shall be consulted on Trail designs relating to that portion to be built upon the UTA Licensed Area, which designs shall be subject to UTA review and approval. City and County shall obtain reimbursement for the design consultant's fees from the Active Transportation Project Grant through UDOT.
- 7. Construction: Coordination with Contractor. City and County are the principal contracting entities with respect to the contractor who will construct and install the Trail on the UTA Property and the City Property. Accordingly, City and County shall retain the contractor and coordinate the construction and installation of the Trail by the contractor. City and County shall obtain reimbursement for the contractor's fees from the Active Transportation Project Grant through UDOT. UTA and City, being the owners of the properties upon which the Trail will be constructed, will coordinate the contractor's access to the properties. UTA, City and the County shall have no responsibility or liability to third parties for the acts of omissions of the contractor.

- 8. <u>Inspection of Contractor's Work</u>. When the contractor indicates that Trail construction is substantially complete under the terms of the construction contract, UTA, City, and County will conduct a joint inspection and walk-through of the Trail. As the parties who have contracted with the contractor, and who will ultimately be responsible for operating and maintaining the Trail, City and County shall have the right to object to any portions of the contractor's work which City or County deems defective or non-compliant with the construction contract. At the completion of the inspection, UTA, City and County will develop a mutually agreeable punch list of open items which the contractor must satisfactorily complete prior to final acceptance of the Trail work. City and County shall cause the contractor to complete the open items in accordance with the approved punch list.
- 9. <u>City and County to Operate Trail</u>. Beginning upon substantial completion of the Trail and continuing thereafter until the expiration or termination of this Agreement, City and County agree to maintain those portions of the Trail within each of their respective jurisdictions. This shall include responsibility for posting and enforcing rules and ordinances related to use of the Trail. This shall include maintaining, repairing, replacing, and reconstructing all pavements, fencing, signage, landscaping or other improvements installed as part of the Trail, with such responsibility to continue throughout the term of this Agreement. This shall also include performing any law enforcement, abatement, or other actions necessary to enforce against encroachment and unlawful conduct, including security monitoring or other activities necessary to protect persons and property on the Trail. UTA will not be responsible for performing enforcement or policing duties.
- 10. <u>License to Operate Trail</u>. UTA will grant the City and County a license allowing the City and County to operate and maintain the Trail upon the UTA Property. The license shall be subject to the terms and conditions of this Agreement and indemnify UTA against damages arising out of the design, construction, maintenance, and use of Trail. The scope of the license shall not include any improvements that are not specifically necessary for the Trail including, without limitation, the installation of public utility crossings or drainage facilities upon, under, along or within the UTA Property. Any out-of-scope uses requested by City or County shall be considered pursuant to a separate licensing process. The market value of the UTA Trail License was appraised by Kendall S. Mitchell, MAI at \$381,700 as of January 23, 2024.
- 11. <u>Maintenance Standard</u>. City and County agree to maintain all Trail improvements within each of their respective jurisdictions in a good and workmanlike manner to include but not limited to the following: (1) Trees, shrubs, bushes should be kept clear of the sides of the Trail by two feet and eight feet in height. (2) The Trail surface should be kept free of weeds, especially puncturevine. (3) The Trail surface should be repaired as needed in order to remain functional and safe. (4) Directional and informational signage should be kept in a clearly legible state and in a manner consistent with City's public parks and County's public facilities. (5) All maintenance shall be performed consistent with the laws, rules, regulations, ordinances or other requirements of any governmental authority having jurisdiction with respect to the property upon which the Trail is constructed and installed. City and County will not be required

to perform any snow removal on the Trail. City and County will maintain the full width of the UTA Licensed Area.

- 12. Work to be Performed by City and County after Initial Installation. Upon completion of the Trail, City and County will be responsible for all subsequent work required to maintain the Trail to the standards contemplated in this Agreement. The parties acknowledge that the historic use of the HOP Corridor as a railroad right-of-way requires the implementation of certain requirements, standards and restrictions related to work to be performed by City and County. City and County agree to cause the preparation of detailed plans and specifications with respect to any non-routine work to be performed by City or County including, without limitation, any work involving the proposed excavation or penetration of surface soils. UTA shall have the right to review and approve such plans and specifications.
- 13. Environmental Covenant. Unless specifically approved in writing by UTA, City and County hereby covenant not to cause or permit the introduction, usage, storage or release of any hazardous materials on or adjacent to the UTA Property. As used in this Agreement, the term "hazardous materials" means any pollutants, toxic substances, hazardous wastes, hazardous substances, oils of any kind or in any form (including petroleum, fuel oil, diesel oils, crude oil or any fraction thereof), and any other substances defined in or pursuant to the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act, the Comprehensive Response, Compensation and Liability Act, the Federal Clean Water Act, the Federal Clean Air Act, the Toxic Substance Control Act, or any other federal, state or local environmental laws, regulation, ordinance, rule or bylaw, as such are amended from time to time, whether existing as of the date hereon, previously enforced or subsequently enacted.
- 14. <u>Allocation of Liability</u>. Each party shall perform the obligations it has assumed under this Agreement in a reasonable manner and in compliance with all applicable laws. Liability for any costs, liabilities, damages, suits, judgments, fines, fees (including attorneys' fees) or other losses (hereafter collectively "Losses") arising from the Trail shall be allocated as follows:
  - 14.1. Each party shall be liable and responsible for any Losses arising from or in connection with its respective breach of the obligations assumed under this Agreement.
  - 14.2 City and County agree to indemnify, defend, and hold UTA harmless from and against any and all Losses relating to (1) use of the Trail, whether legal or illegal, or (2) construction or maintenance activities conducted by City or County or its agents on the Trail, or (3) the design of the Trail, unless such Losses are caused by the gross negligence or misconduct of UTA.
  - 14.3. UTA shall remain liable and responsible for any Losses connected to the existing environmental condition of the UTA Property. City and County shall be liable and responsible for any Losses related to any exacerbation of existing environmental conditions affected by City's or County's breach of its obligations under this Agreement

including, without limitation, City's or County's violation of the covenant contained in this Agreement.

- 14.4. All other Losses shall be allocated as otherwise provided by applicable law.
- 14.5. In cases where a lawsuit, enforcement proceeding, administrative hearing or other adjudicative proceeding is commenced against any party for or on account of Losses for which the other party may be solely or jointly liable under this Agreement, the party thus served shall give other parties timely written notice of the pendency of such proceeding, and thereupon the parties so notified shall assume or join in the defense thereof. No party shall be bound by any judgment against the other parties unless it shall have been so notified and shall have reasonable opportunity to assume or join in the defense of the action.
- 14.6. Nothing provided in this Agreement is intended to waive, modify, limit or otherwise affect any defense or provisions that the parties may assert with respect to any third party. The Parties recognize and acknowledge that they are public or governmental entities covered under the provisions of the Utah Governmental Immunity Act as set forth in Sections 63G-7-101 et. seq. of the Utah Code, as amended, and the limits of liability therein described. Nothing herein shall constitute a waiver of any legal defenses or benefits available under applicable law, and both agree to cooperate in good faith in resolving any disputes that may arise under this Agreement.
- 15. <u>Default</u>. A party shall be deemed in default of this Agreement upon the failure of such party to observe or perform a covenant, condition or agreement on its part to be observed or performed, and the continuation of such failure for a period of 30 days after the giving of written notice by the non-defaulting party(ies), which notice shall specify such failure and request that it be remedied; provided, however, that if the failure stated in such notice cannot be corrected within the applicable period, it shall not give rise to a default hereunder if corrective action is instituted within the 30-day period and thereafter diligently pursued until such failure is corrected. In the event of a default hereunder, the non-defaulting party(ies) shall have a breach of contract claim remedy against the defaulting party in addition to all the other remedies provided or permitted by law, provided that no remedy which would have the effect of amending or termination any provisions of this Agreement shall become effective without formal amendment of this agreement.
- 16. <u>Term</u>. This Agreement shall be effective when fully executed by all parties. Subject to the provisions for termination as provided in Section 17 below, this Agreement shall continue in full force and effect for an initial term of 25 years. Provided that no party is in default with respect to this Agreement, this Agreement shall automatically renew for an additional term of 25 years, provided that no party has delivered (within the 180 days immediately preceding expiration of the initial term) written notice of its intent to terminate the Agreement upon expiration of the initial term.

- 17. <u>Termination</u>. This Agreement and the Trail contemplated hereunder are both subject to recommencement of rail or commencement of other UTA transit operations within the HOP Corridor. Notwithstanding the Term of this Agreement or any other provision of this Agreement, UTA shall have the right to terminate this Agreement, at its sole option, and without recourse on the part of City or County, in the event that freight or public transit operation are commenced (or construction with respect to freight or public transit improvements commences) in the HOP Corridor, by providing 180 days' notice to the other parties.
- 18. <u>Effect of Termination</u>. In the event that this Agreement expires or is terminated prior to expiration, City and County shall peacefully surrender their use of the UTA Property and the UTA Property shall cease to be used as a City and County Trail. UTA, at its expense, may thereafter remove all property constructed upon the UTA Property as part of the Trail.
- 19. <u>Notices</u>. Any notice, demand, request, consent, submission, approval, designation or other communication which any party is required or desires to give under this Agreement shall be made in writing and delivered to the other party(ies) at the addresses set forth below or at such other addresses as such party may provide in writing from time to time. All notices shall be hand delivered, mailed (by first-class mail, postage prepaid) or delivered by courier service as follows:

20. <u>Non-Waiver</u>. No covenant or condition of this Agreement may be waived by any party unless done so in writing by such party. Forbearance or indulgence by any party in any regard

whatsoever shall not constitute a waiver of the covenants or conditions to be performed by the other party(ies).

- 21. <u>Severability</u>. In the event any one or more of the provisions contained in this Agreement are for any reason held to be invalid, illegal or unenforceable in any respect, such invalidity, illegality or unenforceability will not affect any other provisions of the Agreement. This Agreement will be construed as if such invalid, illegal or unenforceable provision had never been contained herein.
- 22. <u>Governing Law</u>. The validity, interpretation and performance of this Agreement and all provisions hereof shall be interpreted in accordance with the laws of the State of Utah, without regard to its law on the conflict of laws. Any dispute arising out of this Agreement that cannot be resolved to the satisfaction of the parties shall only be brought in the District Court of Box Elder County, Utah, which shall have exclusive jurisdiction and venue over any legal action arising under this Agreement.
- 23. <u>No Third-Party Beneficiaries</u>. There are no intended third-party beneficiaries to this Agreement. It is expressly understood that enforcement of the terms and conditions of this Agreement, and all rights of action relating to such enforcement, shall be strictly reserved to the parties, and nothing contained in this Agreement shall give or allow any claim or right of action by any third persons under this Agreement. It is the express intention of the parties that any third person who receives benefits under this Agreement shall be deemed an incidental beneficiary only.
- 24. Entire Agreement: Amendment. This Agreement contains the entire agreement between the parties with respect to the subject matter hereof, and no statements, promises or inducements made by any party or agents of any party that are not contained in this Agreement shall be binding or valid. This Agreement may not be amended, enlarged, modified or altered except through a written instrument signed by all parties.
- 25. <u>Interlocal Act Requirements</u>. In satisfaction of the requirements of the Interlocal Cooperation Act, Title 11. Chapter 13, Utah Code Annotated 1953, as amended, and in connection with this Agreement, the parties agree as follows:
  - 25.1. This Agreement shall be authorized by resolution or ordinance of the governing body or each party.
  - 25.2. This Agreement shall be approved as to form and legality by a duly authorized attorney on behalf of each party.
  - 25.3. A duly executed original counterpart of this Agreement shall be filed with the keeper of records of each party.

- 25.4. Prior to the expiration of the term of this Agreement pursuant to Section 16 of this Agreement, this Agreement may only be terminated by and upon the express written consent of the parties or as otherwise set forth is Section 16.
- 25.5. Except as otherwise specifically provided in this Agreement or in any of the documents incorporated herein, any real or personal property acquired by any party, or by the parties jointly, pursuant to this Agreement shall be acquired and held, and disposed of by such party upon termination of this Agreement as agreed between the parties or as otherwise required by applicable local, state and federal law.
- 25.6. This agreement shall be jointly administered by Willard City Manager and the Box Elder County Community Development Director.

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

Approve TBA2025-11-01 to authorize transfer of \$2,392,000 between various projects within the 2025 Capital Budget as presented.

#### **BACKGROUND:**

Board Policy 2.3 Budget allows the Board of Trustees to amend or supplement the Authority's budget after its adoption. The Board may do this through a Technical Budget Adjustment (TBA) when the request does not increase budget authority, or through a Budget Amendment, after consultation with the Local Advisory Council, when an increase in the annual appropriation authority is requested.

#### **DISCUSSION:**

This proposed Technical Budget Adjustment will transfer a total of \$2,392,000 between 16 projects, including the Capital Contingency, within UTA's 2025 capital budget to aid in project delivery this year.

These adjustments should better align the affected projects with the planned 2025 milestones and anticipated expenditure amounts through the end of 2025. Unanticipated needs or changes to timing, scope, or cost of planned projects are the impetus for most of the proposed adjustments. Any contractual changes necessitated by these adjustments will come to the board for approval according to required value thresholds. Tables found in the attached exhibit show the full impact of this Technical Budget Adjustment.

#### **ALTERNATIVES:**

The Board may reject or request revisions to the requested Technical Budget Adjustment.

#### **FISCAL IMPACT:**

The proposed TBA of \$2,392,000 will be funded by the approved 2025 Capital Budget. Funds will be redistributed among the projects described in the presentation and supplemental material contained within this packet.

If TBA is approved, there will be a balance remaining in the Capital Contingency of \$3,468,000. The funding source amounts for the Capital Contingency line are as follows: \$555,000 in Bonds, \$260,000 in Grant funds, \$437,000 in State funds, \$198,000 in Local Partner funds, and \$2,018,000 in UTA funds. This TBA would have a net decrease of \$1,012,000 to the Capital Contingency. The Grant, State, and Local Partner fund portions of the Capital Contingency are affected by this TBA. Contingency funds will be used for the following: \$334,000 in grant funds will go to the 5310 program and rail replacement program; \$600,000 in state funds will go to FrontRunner 2X; \$78,000 in local partner funds will go to the 5310 program. There is no change to the UTA fund portion of the contingency.

There is no increase in budget authority. There is no impact on UTA's Fund Balance.

On October 21, 2020, the Board of Trustees approved the contract with Cities Digital to use the enterprise system Laserfiche, which is set to expire in November 2025.

#### **DISCUSSION:**

Currently, Laserfiche is used for multiple Enterprise-wide processes and is integrated into existing and new Enterprise Asset systems. It is the main system of official records for the agency.

A substantial duplication of costs using a different vendor would result in additional costs (migration of records, records management record series, rebuilding of records repositories, security groups and access, workflows and process routing).

Cities Digital Inc is the vendor that UTA has used to create and set up custom workflows that are not a part of general out of the box Laserfiche systems.

WHEREAS, UTA and the Contractor now desire to modify the Contract Agreement as set forth herein.

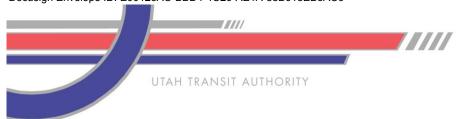

Approve and authorize the Executive Director to execute Task Order 25-046 and associated disbursements on the on-call infrastructure maintenance task ordering contract with Stacy and Witbeck, Inc. in the amount of \$655,493 to obtain ADA-compliance on 29 bus stops as part of the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) 5339 Federal Program funds received by UTA.

#### **BACKGROUND:**

In December 2023, UTA released a Request for Procurement for an on-call maintenance contractor focused specifically on infrastructure assets and other on-call services. Bids were received and evaluated, and Stacy and Witbeck, Inc. was selected as the winner based on overall scoring using the best value format.

On April 18, 2024, The UTA Board of Trustees approved the contract and authorized the Executive Director to execute the Master Task Ordering Agreement (MTOA) with Stacy and Witbeck Inc. on April 18, 2024. The MTOA is for three (3) years, plus two (2) one-year options, with a total 5-year not-to-exceed value of \$45,000,000. This work has been verified to be within the scope of the Stacy and Witbeck on-call contract.

These projects typically address:

- Passenger ride quality
- Access to Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA)-compliant bus stops

#### **DISCUSSION:**

UTA staff is requesting approval of Task Order 25-046 with Stacy and Witbeck, Inc. to complete the construction of 29 bus stops in Utah and Salt Lake Counties. The scope of this request includes time, labor, materials, and other items needed to complete these stops.

By improving and constructing these stops, we are providing ADA-compliant stops for our passengers, improving rider amenities, and adding additional safety factors. This task order is within the scope of the MTOA.

The task order pricing has been determined to be fair and reasonable based on both a UTA-independent cost estimate and the performance of a price analysis.

#### **BACKGROUND:**

Utah's Public Transit District Act requires all contracts valued at \$250,000 or greater be approved by the UTA Board of Trustees. This informational report on upcoming procurements allows Trustees to be informed and provide input on upcoming procurement projects. Following the bid solicitation and contract negotiation process, final contracts for these projects will come before the board for approval.

#### **DISCUSSION:**

# Transit Signal Priority (TSP) Corridor Study

The Innovative Mobility Services Department is seeking to contract with a consultant to conduct a Transit Signal Priority (TSP) Corridor Study.

UTA has made significant investments in TSP technology, which prioritizes equipped buses at signalized intersections to improve travel time and reliability. The selected consultant will develop a modeling-based framework and dashboard to guide data-driven decisions for optimizing TSP deployment and improving overall bus network performance. The consultant will also remain available on an on-call basis throughout

the five-year study period to support future needs.

This procurement will be conducted as a Request for Proposal (RFP), where technical criteria will be evaluated and scored in addition to price. The term of this procurement is five (5) years. Funding for this project is included in the approved Capital Projects budget under MSP270. (#15990, PM-Hal Johnson)

## Compressed Natural Gas (CNG) Fueling Building Expansion

The Facilities Department is seeking to contract with a firm to design and construct an addition to Depot District Building 5 to increase CNG fueling facility capacity. The existing building, originally constructed in 2015, was designed to accommodate this expansion.

The project will include a 75 x 25-foot addition on the east side of the building, installation of new fueling infrastructure-including two additional fuel storage vessels-and various building upgrades to support the expansion. This increased capacity is required to accommodate additional CNG buses awarded to UTA through the Low-No grant program.

This procurement will be conducted as a Request for Proposal (RFP), where technical criteria will be evaluated and scored in addition to price. The contract term will be two (2) years. Funding for this project is included in the approved Capital Projects budget under MSP260. (#16072, PM-Ethan Ray)

## • Purchasing Card Program Administration

The Procurement Department is seeking to contract with a firm to facilitate and administer UTA's Purchasing Card (P-Card) program. The selected firm will be responsible for card issuance, fraud monitoring, transaction reconciliation and receipt management, as well as providing tools and reporting capabilities to ensure compliance with UTA's internal purchasing policies and procedures.

UTA currently maintains approximately 400 individual and departmental P-cards used for purchases under \$5,000, providing an efficient payment method that reduces the administrative costs associated with issuing purchase orders and processing accounts payable transactions. Transitioning between Purchasing Card (P-Card) systems is a complex and resource-intensive process. To ensure program stability, minimize disruption, and maximize long-term value, it is in the best interest of the agency to establish a five (5) year contract with five (5) optional one-year extensions.

This procurement will be conducted as a Request for Proposal (RFP), where technical criteria will be evaluated and scored in addition to price. Department budgets will be charged for department purchases at the end of each month.

# SKI BUS PASS AGREEMENT ALTA SKI AREA 2025-2026

THIS PASS AGREEMENT is made this 1<sup>st</sup> day of November 2025, between the **UTAH TRANSIT AUTHORITY**, a public transit district organized under the laws of the State of Utah ("Authority" or "UTA") and **ALTA SKI AREA**, ("Administrator").

WHEREAS The Authority is a public transit district organized under the provisions of the Utah Public Transit District Act that provides public transportation service along the Wasatch Front, including in Big and Little Cottonwood Canyon, and is authorized by State law to enter contracts; and

WHEREAS Administrator operates a ski resort in Big or Little Cottonwood Canyon, sells season passes to the public, and hires employees to assist in the operation of its ski resort; and

WHEREAS Administrator desires to participate in UTA's Pass program pursuant to the terms and conditions described below.

NOW THEREFORE, Administrator and UTA hereby covenant and agree to be bound by the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement:

#### **DEFINITIONS**

- A. The term "Authorized User" means Administrator's employees and season pass holders who have been issued a Pass in compliance with this Agreement.
- B. The term "Local Service" means regular fixed route bus, bus rapid transit, Microtransit, Streetcar light rail, and TRAX light rail routes operated by UTA that offer standard public transit service making frequent stops along designated streets, highways, and/or TRAX/Streetcar stations.
- C. The term "Pass" means a card issued by Administrator to an Authorized User under the terms of this Agreement for use on UTA's transit system.
- D. The term "Shuttle Service" means travel between the ski resorts. Big Cottonwood shuttle means travel between Brighton and Solitude. Little Cottonwood shuttle means travel between Alta and Snowbird.
- E. The term "Ski Bus Service" means public transit service in Big and Little Cottonwood Canyons on routes and schedules determined by the Authority. This includes both services provided by and contracted by UTA.

## **TERMS AND CONDITIONS**

- 1. **TERM.** This Pass Agreement shall begin on the date stated above and end May 31, 2026.
- 2. **PASSES.** Administrator shall issue a Pass for use on UTA's transportation services in the form of a unique electronic micro-chip embedded in an electronic fare card media that

complies with UTA's requirements to Authorized Users only. Passes are non-transferrable. Administrator agrees to provide UTA educational information to each Authorized User regarding UTA's Electronic Fare Collection ("EFC") Pass Program Guidelines and Rules, particularly the requirement that Authorized Users tap on prior to boarding and tap off upon alighting.

- 3. **PASS RECOGNIZED AS TRANSIT FARE.** For the term of this agreement, a Pass issued to an Authorized User under this Agreement, when displayed together with valid photo identification upon request, shall be recognized as full fare when the Authorized User has tapped.
- 4. **PAYMENT FOR PASSES.** Administrator is responsible for paying the full amount owed to UTA, regardless of whether Administrator receives payment for Passes from a third party. Administrator shall pay the amount invoiced by the due dates identified below. UTA shall charge Administrator a one percent (1%) per month late fee on balances due under this Agreement that remain unpaid forty-five (45) days from date of invoice. Payment can be made in the following forms: Check, ACH, and/or Wire Transfer. Checks should be made payable to UTA and mailed to the following address: Utah Transit Authority, Accounts receivable, 669 West 200 South, Salt Lake City, Utah 84101. ACH/WIRE instructions are available upon request.
  - A. **Daily With Adjustments.** UTA shall issue Administrator an invoice for actual Pass usage each month within seven days after the month ends. Administrator agrees to pay \$8.00 for each day the Authorized User travels on UTA Ski Bus Service and Local Service. Administrator agrees to pay \$5 for each day the Authorized User travels on Local Service and does not travel on UTA Ski Bus Service. The billable ski days on the invoice will be reduced by 4% to account for missing shuttle trips. Administrator agrees to pay a reduced rate of \$4.00 for an agreed upon # of billable ski days. Administrator may elect to add FrontRunner service to an Authorized User's Pass by submitting a bulk import file. For Passes with FrontRunner service Administrator agrees to pay the public fare rate of those trips in addition to the daily Ski Bus Service or Local Service fare rates. No transfer credits will be applied to the FrontRunner fare.
  - B. **Daily With Weekly Cap.** UTA shall issue Administrator an invoice for actual Pass usage as described in 4A above, not to exceed \$28 per week per Authorized User, each month within seven days after the month ends. The weekly cap is only extended to Users who are either employees or season pass holders. The weekly cap also excludes FrontRunner fares.
    - i. Fares will be determined by the Authority using UTA's EFC system. Passes that are not identified as Season Pass Holder or Employee will be billed at the daily rate described in Section 4A above.
  - C. **Shuttle Service.** Shuttle service will be excluded from an Administrator's monthly billing when a rider taps on and off when travelling between resorts.
  - D. **Ikon Passes.** Use of passes designated as "Ikon" in the property fields in the electronic fare system, and normally paid for by Solitude Ski Resort, shall be billed to each resort.

- Administrator agrees to pay for trips by Ikon pass holders to travel to the Administrator's resort. Ikon pass holders shall be considered as season pass holders for fare calculation purposes.
- E. **UTA Contracted Service.** Trips taken by Authorized Users on UTA contracted service shall be billed according to the terms of this Agreement unless electronic tap readers are not installed on the buses before ski service begins. In the event electronic readers are not available, both parties shall mutually agree in writing to a pricing methodology that will allow UTA to receive payment from Administrator for these trips.
- 5. **CONFISCATION AND UNAUTHORIZED USE OF PASS.** UTA shall have the right to confiscate a Pass at any time (without notice to the Administrator) from any person who UTA reasonably believes is not an Authorized User or if UTA reasonably believes the Pass has been duplicated, altered, or used in an unauthorized way. UTA will immediately deactivate confiscated Passes and notify the Administrator. If the Pass is an Administrator provided card, UTA will return it to Administrator.
- 6. **RECONCILIATION.** UTA maintains the right, upon reasonable notice, to inspect during regular business hours, all Passes always maintained by Administrator during the term of this Agreement and for a period of one year after the expiration or termination of this Agreement. Administrator shall cooperate with and permit UTA to examine the unissued Passes distributed to Administrator and the Passes sold and to inspect and reconcile all records and accounts pertaining to this agreement monthly

#### 7. **REPORTING**

- A. Partner Website. The Authority agrees to provide the following information to Administrator through <a href="www.tap2rideuta.com">www.tap2rideuta.com</a>, which may be accessed at any time: (1) Ridership- parameters include a date range with trip counts by Pass number or service type; (2) Active Passes- a count of total active passes; (3) Pass Summary- the current status of each Pass, the Pass number, and property field to the extent completed by Administrator; and (4) Action History- a summary of all changes made to Passes. Administrator may access this information at <a href="www.tap2rideuta.com">www.tap2rideuta.com</a> by selecting "reports."
- B. **Ridership Data.** Each monthly billing cycle, UTA agrees to provide Administrator with a report of its' Authorized Users' daily usage on Ski Bus Service during the preceding month.
- C. **Additional Ridership Data.** Subject to Utah Code 17B-2a-815(3)(a), which limits the type of ridership data UTA may disclose to third party administrators, the Authority will provide additional Authorized User ridership data to Administrator upon request. Requests for additional ridership data must be emailed to passprograms@rideuta.com.
- D. **Administrator Data.** Administrator agrees to identify the type of each Pass issued in the property fields on the UTA Third Party Partner Website or the bulk import spreadsheet (employee or season pass-holder). UTA encourages Administrator to provide additional information in the property fields of the UTA Partner Website or

- bulk import spreadsheet so that the parties can obtain more comprehensive ridership data in connection with the Ski Bus Service.
- E. **MONTHLY REPORTING.** The Authority will provide Administrator with a monthly report summarizing key information agreed upon by the resorts and UTA in advance. UTA can also provide Administrator with a breakdown of EFC Pass holder usage only if Administrator provides Pass holder information through bulk import.
- 8. **CONGESTION MITIGATION.** Administrator agrees to take reasonable affirmative actions to assist with traffic control to facilitate smooth entrance and exit for UTA ski buses from ski resort parking lots.
- 9. **TERMINATION OF AGREEMENT.** This Agreement may be terminated with or without cause by either party by providing thirty (30) days advance written notice of termination. In the event the Agreement is terminated after UTA begins Service, the amount owed under this Agreement shall be prorated based on the number of days UTA provided the Service.
- 10. **THIRD PARTY INTERESTS.** No person not a party to this Agreement shall have any rights or entitlements of any nature under it.
- 11. **ENTIRE AGREEMENT.** This Agreement contains the entire agreement between the parties hereto for the term stated and cannot be modified except by written agreement signed by both parties. Neither party shall be bound by any oral agreement or special arrangements contrary to or in addition to the terms and condition as stated herein.
- 12. **COSTS AND ATTORNEY'S FEES.** If either party pursues legal action to enforce any covenant of this Agreement, the parties agree that all costs and expenses of the prevailing party incident to such legal action, including reasonable attorneys' fees and court costs shall be paid by the non-prevailing party.
- 13. **NOTICES.** Except as otherwise indicated, notices to be given hereunder shall be sufficient if given in writing in person or by personal delivery, U.S. mail, or electronic mail. Notices shall be deemed effective and complete at the time of receipt, provided that the refusal to accept delivery shall be construed as receipt for purposes of this Agreement.

- 21. **WAIVER.** The waiver by either party of any of the covenants as contained in this Agreement shall not be deemed a waiver of such party's rights to enforce the same or any other covenant

- herein, and the rights and remedies of the parties hereunder shall be in addition to, and not in lieu of, any right or remedy as provided by law.
- 22. **NO PRECEDENT**. Both Parties acknowledge that this agreement is applicable only until May 31, 2026, and that a new agreement including new terms and conditions will need to be negotiated for future ski resort service. This agreement does not set a precedent for those future agreements.

## SKI BUS PASS AGREEMENT SUNDANCE SKI RESORT 2025-2026

THIS PASS AGREEMENT is made this 1<sup>st</sup> day of November 2025, between the **UTAH TRANSIT AUTHORITY**, a public transit district organized under the laws of the State of Utah ("Authority" or "UTA") and **SUNDANCE SKI RESORT**, ("Administrator").

WHEREAS The Authority is a public transit district organized under the provisions of the Utah Public Transit District Act that provides public transportation service along the Wasatch Front and is authorized by State law to enter contracts; and

WHEREAS Administrator operates a ski resort in Provo Canyon, sells season passes to the public, and hires employees to assist in the operation of its ski resort; and

WHEREAS Administrator desires to participate in UTA's Pass program pursuant to the terms and conditions described below.

NOW THEREFORE, Administrator and UTA hereby covenant and agree to be bound by the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement:

Approve and authorize the Executive Director to execute the 2025/26 Ski Bus Pass Agreement with SMHG Management LLC/Powder Mountain.

#### **BACKGROUND:**

SMHG Management LLC/Powder Mountain ("Powder Mountain") operates a ski resort situated in Ogden Valley and wishes to participate in UTA's pass program. Utah Transit Authority ("UTA") has partnered with Powder Mountain in the past and both parties desire to enter into another agreement for the 2025/26 ski season.

#### **DISCUSSION:**

Under this agreement, Powder Mountain will pay for each trip taken by its authorized users using the base one -way ski fare, discounted twenty percent (20%) and trip count will be determined by UTA's automatic passenger counter ("APC") data from route 674. The estimated value of this contract is \$95,000 based on last year's ridership.

#### SKI BUS PASS AGREEMENT

SMHG Management LLC, A Delaware limited liability company "Powder Mountain" 2025-2026

This Ski Bus Pass Agreement ("Agreement") is made effective this 12<sup>th</sup> day of November 2025 ("Effective Date") between the **UTAH TRANSIT AUTHORITY**, a public transit district organized under the laws of the State of Utah ("Authority" or "UTA") and **SMHG Management LLC**, a **Delaware limited liability company** ("Administrator" or "Powder Mountain").

#### **RECITALS**

WHEREAS, Authority is a public transit district organized under the provisions of the Utah Public Transit District Act that provides public transportation service along the Wasatch Front and is authorized by State law to enter contracts; and

WHEREAS, Administrator operates a ski resort situated in Ogden Valley, sells season passes to the public, and hires employees to assist in the operation of its ski resort; and

WHEREAS, Administrator desires to participate in UTA's Pass program pursuant to the terms and conditions described below.

NOW THEREFORE, Administrator and UTA covenant and agree to be bound by the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement:

#### **DEFINITIONS**

- A. The term "Authorized User" means Administrator's employees and season pass holders who have been issued a Pass in compliance with this Agreement.
- B. The term "Automatic Passenger Counter" means ridership data captured directly from sensors on UTA's vehicles.
- C. The term "Pass" means a card issued by Administrator to an Authorized User under the terms of this Agreement for use on UTA's transit system.
- D. The term "Ski Bus Service" means seasonal public transit service on routes and schedules determined by the Authority which operates during winter change day.

## **TERMS AND CONDITIONS**

- 1. **TERM.** This Agreement shall begin on the date stated above and end April 11,2026.
- 2. PASSES. Administrator shall issue a Pass for use on UTA's transportation services in the form of a unique electronic micro-chip embedded in an electronic fare card media that complies with UTA's requirements to Authorized Users only. Administrator agrees to provide UTA educational information ("Educational Information") to each Authorized User regarding UTA's Electronic Fare Collection ("EFC") Pass Program Guidelines and Rules, particularly the requirement that Authorized Users tap on prior to boarding and tap off upon alighting. UTA will provide the Educational Information to Administrator prior to the Effective Date to enable Administrator to comply with this Section 2. UTA acknowledges that Administrator is transitioning to a digital credential for its Authorized Users. UTA will accept the digital credential as a flash pass on Route 674 until an alternative solution can be implemented by agreement of the parties.
- 3. **PASS RECOGNIZED AS TRANSIT FARE.** So long as this Agreement has not been terminated in accordance with Paragraph 14, each Pass issued in accordance with the EFC Rules and used in accordance with the terms of this Agreement shall be recognized as full fare for ski service, so long as the user of the Pass is eligible under the terms of this Agreement to remain an Authorized User.
- 4. **NON-TRANSFERRABLE.** A Pass is not transferable.
- 5. **ISSUING PASSES.** Administrator shall be solely responsible for issuing a Pass to an Authorized User.
- 6. **PAYMENT FOR PASSES.** Administrator shall pay to UTA the base one-way fare discounted twenty percent (20%) for each trip per the service type authorized in Exhibit B for each trip during the preceding month. Payment can be made in the following forms: Check, ACH, and/or Wire Transfer. Checks should be made payable to UTA and mailed to the following address: Utah Transit Authority, Accounts receivable, 669 West 200 South, Salt Lake City, Utah 84101. ACH/WIRE instructions are available upon request. Administrator is responsible for paying the full amount owed to UTA, regardless of whether Administrator receives payment for Passes from a third party.
- 7. **CALCULATION OF FARES.** Payment of fares shall be calculated as follows:
  - a. Automatic Passenger Counter ("APC) data from Route 674 will be used to calculate the number of trips for each month minus trips captured on Route 674 from UTA's electronic fare collection system. The applicable base one-way fare will be applied to each trip, see Exhibit B.
    - b. UTA reserves the right to charge a fare based on an average of trips, if ridership data is not available or functioning properly as determined by UTA in UTA's sole discretion.

- c. The base-one way fare rates are the rates posted on UTA's website www.rideuta.com and are the same as the rates charged to UTA full fare paying customers. UTA reserves the right to adjust its rates during the term of this Agreement, according to its operational needs as determined by UTA in its sole discretion. The base-one way fare rate will be charged at the rate in effect at the time of the Trip.
- d UTA shall invoice Administrator monthly. UTA's invoice shall state: (1) the number of Trips; (2) the total amount in Base One-Way Fares; and (3) the amount of applicable discount. Payments shall be made by Administrator to UTA within thirty (30) days of receipt of an invoice. UTA shall charge and Administrator shall pay a one percent (1%) late fee on balances due under this Agreement which remain unpaid within thirty (30) days from the due date indicated on the invoice. UTA shall charge and Administrator shall pay a five percent (5%) processing fee in the event Administrator elects to remit payment using a credit/debit card.
- 8. **CONFISCATION AND UNAUTHORIZED USE OF PASS.** UTA shall have the right to confiscate a Pass at any time (without notice to Administrator) from any person who UTA reasonably believes is not an Authorized User or if UTA reasonably believes the Pass has been duplicated, altered, or used in an unauthorized way. UTA will immediately deactivate confiscated Passes and notify the Administrator. If the Pass is an Administrator provided card, UTA will return it to Administrator.
- 9. **RECONCILIATION.** Administrator shall cooperate with and permit UTA to examine unused Passes distributed to Administrator and reconcile all records and accounts pertaining to this Agreement if requested by UTA.

#### 10. REPORTING

- A Partner Website. Authority agrees to provide the following information to Administrator through <a href="www.tap2rideuta.com">www.tap2rideuta.com</a>, which may be accessed at any time: (1) Ridership- parameters include a date range with trip counts by Pass number or service type; (2) Active Passes- a count of total active passes; (3) Pass Summary- the current status of each Pass, the Pass number, and property field to the extent completed by Administrator; and (4) Action History- a summary of all changes made to Passes. Administrator may access this information at <a href="www.tap2rideuta.com">www.tap2rideuta.com</a> by selecting "reports."
- B Ridership Data. Each monthly billing cycle, UTA agrees to provide Administrator with a report of its' Authorized Users' daily usage on Ski Bus Service during the preceding month.
- C Additional Ridership Data. Subject to Utah Code 17B-2a-815(3)(a), which limits the type of ridership data UTA may disclose to third party administrators, the Authority will provide additional Authorized User

- ridership data to Administrator upon request. Requests for additional ridership data must be emailed to passprograms@rideuta.com.
- Administrator Data. Administrator agrees to identify the type of each Pass issued in the property fields on the UTA Third Party Partner Website or the bulk import spreadsheet (employee or season pass-holder). UTA encourages Administrator to provide additional information in the property fields of the UTA Partner Website or bulk import spreadsheet so that the parties can obtain more comprehensive ridership data in connection with the Ski Bus Service.
- Monthly Reporting. Authority will provide Administrator with a monthly report summarizing key information agreed upon by the resorts and UTA in advance. UTA can also provide Administrator with a breakdown of EFC Pass holder usage only if Administrator provides Pass holder information through bulk import.
- 11. **CONGESTION MITIGATION.** Administrator agrees to take reasonable affirmative actions to assist with traffic control to facilitate smooth entrance and exit for UTA ski buses from ski resort parking lots.
- 12. **SKI BUS SERVICE.** UTA agrees to operate ski bus service on schedules and routes determined by UTA. Details can be found on UTA's website at www.rideuta.com/schedules. UTA reserves the right to adjust the schedule according to its operational needs as determined by UTA in its sole discretion.
- 13. **TERMINATION OF AGREEMENT.** This Agreement shall continue in full force and effect during the term of this Agreement unless it is terminated earlier by either party. Each party, in its sole discretion, may terminate this Agreement by giving the other party written notice of termination at least sixty (60) days prior to termination date.
- 14. **THIRD PARTY INTERESTS.** No person not a party to this Agreement shall have any rights or entitlements of any nature under it.
- 15. **ENTIRE AGREEMENT.** This Agreement contains the entire agreement between the parties hereto for the term stated and cannot be modified except by written agreement signed by both parties. Neither party shall be bound by any oral agreement or special arrangements contrary to or in addition to the terms and conditions stated herein.
- 16. **COSTS AND ATTORNEY'S FEES.** If either party pursues legal action to enforce any covenant of this Agreement, the parties agree that all costs and expenses of the prevailing party incident to such legal action, including reasonable attorneys' fees and court costs shall be paid by the non-prevailing party.
- 17. **NOTICES.** Except as otherwise indicated, notices to be given hereunder shall be sufficient if given in writing in person or by personal delivery, U.S. mail, or electronic mail. Notices shall be

deemed effective and complete at the time of receipt, provided that the refusal to accept delivery shall be construed as receipt for purposes of this Agreement.

Either party may change the address at which such party desires to receive written notice by giving written notice of such change to the other party. Any such notice shall be deemed to have been given, and shall be effective, on delivery to the notice address then applicable for the party to which the notice is directed, provided, however, that refusal to accept delivery of a notice or the inability to deliver a notice because of an address change which was not properly communicated shall not defeat or delay the giving of a notice.

- 18. **INTENT TO BE LEGALLY BOUND.** The undersigned parties have duly caused this Agreement to be executed and any individual signatories executing on behalf of a governmental entity, corporation or limited liability company are duly authorized by his or her respective governmental entity, corporation, or limited liability company employer to execute this Agreement.
- 19. **NON-DISCRIMINATION**. Administrator agrees that it shall not exclude any individual from participation in or deny any individual the benefits of this Agreement, based on race, color, national origin, creed, sex, or age in accordance with the requirements of 49 U.S.C. 5332.
- 20. **DEFAULT.** In the event that either party fails to perform any of the terms and conditions required to be performed pursuant to this Agreement, and upon fifteen (15) days' notice of such failure to perform, the non-defaulting party under this agreement may terminate this Agreement. In the event that Administrator fails to pay UTA, Administrator shall be liable for not only amounts due under this Agreement, but also collection costs including court costs and reasonable attorney's fees.
- 21. **SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS.** This Agreement shall not be assigned without the written consent of the other party. This Agreement with all its terms and provision shall be binding and inure to the benefit of any permitted successors and assigns of the parties hereto.

- 22. **AMENDMENTS.** This Agreement may not be modified or terminated orally, and no claimed modification, rescission or waiver shall be binding upon either party unless in writing signed by a duly authorized representative of each party.
- 23. **INDEMNIFICATION.** The parties mutually agree to indemnify, defend, and hold harmless the other party, its directors, officers, agents, and employees against all claims, actions, debts or loss to the extent arising from a breach of a covenant, or other breach or default by the indemnifying party under this Agreement. The Parties recognize and acknowledge that UTA is a public or governmental agency or entity covered under the provisions of the Utah Governmental Immunity Act as set forth in Sections 63-30-1 to 63-30-38, Utah Code Annotated 1953, as amended, and the limits of liability therein described. UTA does not waive any legal defense or benefit available to it under applicable law. Both parties agree to cooperate in good faith in resolving any disputes that may arise under this Agreement.
- 24. **GOVERNING LAW**. This Agreement and all transactions contemplated hereunder and/or evidenced hereby shall be governed by and construed under and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of Utah without giving effect to any choice of law or conflict of law rules or provisions.
- 25. **WAIVER.** The waiver by either party of any of the covenants as contained in this Agreement shall not be deemed a waiver of such party's rights to enforce the same or any other covenant herein, and the rights and remedies of the parties hereunder shall be in addition to, and not in lieu of, any right or remedy as provided by law.

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

Approve and authorize the Executive Director to execute the Salt Lake Ski Super Pass Agreement-Amendment Four with Visit Salt Lake.

#### **BACKGROUND:**

Visit Salt Lake, a Utah non-profit corporation, markets a Salt Lake Ski Super Pass ("Super Pass") to multiple tourism entities in the Salt Lake City area. The Super Pass is redeemable by the holder for an all-day ticket at: Snowbird Ski Resort, Alta Ski Area, Brighton Resort and Solitude Ski Resort. The Super Pass also includes UTA's Electronic Fare Collection "EFC" information, allowing the holder to ride transit to the resort (per the original contract with Visit Salt Lake approved by the Board of Trustees on November 10, 2021).

Entities promoting tourism sell the Super Pass as part of their travel/overnight lodging packages and Visit Salt Lake reimburses UTA for transit usage by the Super Pass holders monthly during the ski season. Visit Salt Lake is responsible for designing, producing, marketing, and distributing the Super Pass that includes UTA's Electronic Fare Collection "EFC" information within each pass. The Super Pass is only distributed to Providers and is not directly sold to the public.

To streamline the distribution process, patrons purchasing a Super Pass will first receive a voucher confirmation. This confirmation is valid fare on ski bus service and connecting UTA service for a single, initial trip to a resort. Once at a resort, vouchers shall be exchanged for a Super Pass.

Visit Salt Lake has paid UTA a daily rate of \$8.00 per day, per card tapped, which was a 20% discount off the

round-trip ski bus fare.

UTA and Visit Salt Lake entered into a Super Pass agreement in the 2021/22 season under contract 21-F0248. UTA and Visit Salt Lake extended the contract again by Amendment Three (3) in 2024 as approved by the Board of Trustees on December 18, 2024.

This agreement expires on November 30, 2025, and both parties desire to renew this agreement.

#### **DISCUSSION:**

Visit Salt Lake and UTA will partner together once again through Amendment Four (4) to the Salt Lake Ski Super Pass Agreement for the 2025/26 Ski Season. The term of this agreement is to reinstate for a new term effective December 1, 2025, and continue in full force until November 30, 2026. All other terms of the agreement, including pricing, will remain the same.

#### **BACKGROUND:**

UTA's 5-year Capital Plan is required to be updated every year (UTA Board of Trustees Policy 2.1 Financial Management). The 5-Year Capital Plan includes all construction, capital improvements, major equipment purchases, and other special projects requiring expenditures over \$25,000. This includes projects that are funded partially or fully by outside funding sources, such as grants or local partners.

The plan is required to be financially constrained and maintain assets in a state of good repair, to protect UTA's capital investments, and minimize future maintenance and replacement costs. Five-year forecasts help mitigate the challenges of applying a one-year budget to multi-year projects and support long-range financial planning and prudent management of the Enterprise.

#### **DISCUSSION:**

During the last discussion, there were two feedback items: (1) Review project names and edit as needed for clarity, and (2) Include brief project descriptions. In the attached 2026-2030 Five-Year Capital Plan document, there is now a Project Overview section (Chapter 6) which contains a Project Key section identifying the project codes, as well as an updated list of project names, brief project descriptions, and the overall five-year

plan amount.

The updated plan document also includes Appendix A, the 2026-2030 Five Year Capital Plan Summary, which contains a breakdown of the information presented in the narrative in a consolidated table format.

Since the Board last reviewed the plan, staff has identified other changes needed to facilitate project completion during 2026 and beyond. Staff will present the revised 5-Year Capital Plan for 2026-2030 for Board information as well as highlight 2026 specifically. Information will include feedback and changes incorporated since the last discussion on September 24th.

#### **ALTERNATIVES:**

No alternatives. This discussion is responsive to Board of Trustees feedback.

#### **FISCAL IMPACT:**

The Five-Year Capital Plan sets financial expectations for the coming 2026-2030 period about how UTA will spend its funds. The Plan amount is \$1,069,129,000. This is made up of a combination of external funding sources such as federal or state partners, local entity partners, financing, or UTA funds. This plan contains \$277,267,000 in UTA funds.

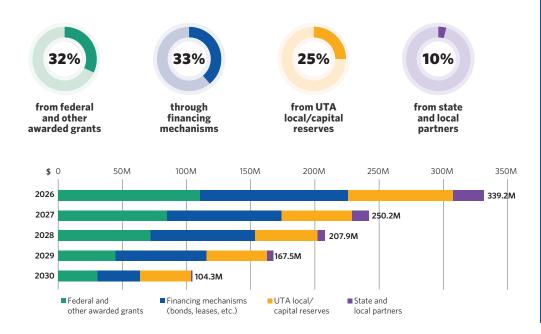
#### PLANNING AND PRIORITIZATION PROCESS

UTA's capital planning process produces a prioritized five-year project list aligned with strategic goals, legal requirements, and funding realities. Projects are proposed, reviewed, and refined to address mobility, safety, and State of Good Repair needs while ensuring alignment with long-term agency priorities and available resources. **The final plan** baLanes immediate needs with long-term strategic goals and reflects a forward-looking investment strategy that is grounded in both practical and strategic needs.



#### **INVESTMENT OVERVIEW**

The 2026-2030 Plan represents **\$1.07B in capital investment over five years**, designed to maintain and expand Utah's transit infrastructure through a mix of sources:



## ANNUAL INVESTMENT HIGHLIGHTS:

- \$339.2M in 2026 (largest year of investment).
- A gradual tapering to \$104.3M by 2030 as large-scale projects reach completion.
- Capital spending is front-loaded with \$339.2 invested in 2026 to advance large-scale construction, followed by more moderate annual investments of \$250.2M-207.9M in 2027-2028, \$167.5M in 2029, and \$104.3M in 2030 as projects reach completion and focus shifts to ongoing maintenance and renewal.

## OTHER ESSENTIAL SERVICES

Includes departments focused on people, communication, safety and security, and public engagement and planning, which are critical to UTA's ability to deliver responsive, transparent, and community-driven service.



#### **UTA/UDOT PARTNERSHIP AND PROJECTS**

The Utah Legislature has taken significant steps to strengthen the State's role in delivering major transit investments. In 2022, **HB322** designated the Utah Department of Transportation (UDOT) as the lead agency for delivering fixed guideway projects using state funds. This partnership was further reinforced in 2025 with the passage of **SB174**, which designated UDOT as the lead agency for delivering fixed guideway projects regardless of funding source. UTA and UDOT continue to collaborate closely on high-impact projects, as seen on the map.

These projects represent the state's ongoing commitment to expanding transit options and leveraging public investment for regional growth and accessibility.



#### **LOOKING AHEAD**

**UTA's Five-Year Capital Plan is a key tool for aligning today's investment decisions with tomorrow's transit needs.** It supports regional transportation goals while remaining a reliable partner in delivering efficient and safe transit service for Utah residents. This plan strengthens UTA's ability to meet growing demand, build critical infrastructure, and support the state's continued population and economic growth through 2030 and beyond.





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#### Chapter 1

# Purpose of This Plan



The Five-Year Capital Plan (5YCP) is a strategic tool that guides UTA's capital investments over a five-year period. It helps ensure that resources are aligned with agency priorities, projects are delivered efficiently, and long-term infrastructure needs are responsibly managed.



#### **KEY PURPOSES AND FEATURES OF THE 5YCP INCLUDE:**

**Annual Updates:** The Plan is updated annually as part of UTA's budgeting process, in accordance with Board Policy No. 2.1: Financial Management. Each update ensures the plan remains fiscally constrained and supports the long-term health of the system by prioritizing a state of good repair, safe and reliable service, and cost-effective asset management.

As part of this process, new project requests are added and existing projects are refined with the latest information. This includes updates to project scope, cost estimates, schedules, and funding strategies to ensure the plan reflects current priorities and conditions.

**Improved Accuracy Over Time:** As projects move closer to implementation, cost estimates and funding sources become more precise, enabling smarter investment decisions.

**Contract Authorization:** Approval of the 5YCP grants UTA the authority to enter into contracts for multi-year capital projects.

**Long-Term Financial Planning:** A five-year outlook helps overcome the limitations of a one-year budget cycle, providing a clearer path for setting priorities and managing large, complex projects.

**Regional Coordination:** The 5YCP also supports regional planning efforts, serving as an input to transportation plans and funding strategies led by metropolitan planning organizations (MPOs).

#### **DEFINITION OF CAPITAL PROJECTS**

Capital projects are defined as all construction efforts, capital improvements, major equipment purchases, and other special projects requiring one or more expenditures totaling \$25,000 or more. This includes projects that are partially or fully funded by outside sources (e.g. grants, state funds, local partners, etc.). Other requests under \$25,000 should be included in departmental operating budgets.

# Five-Year Capital Plan Development Process

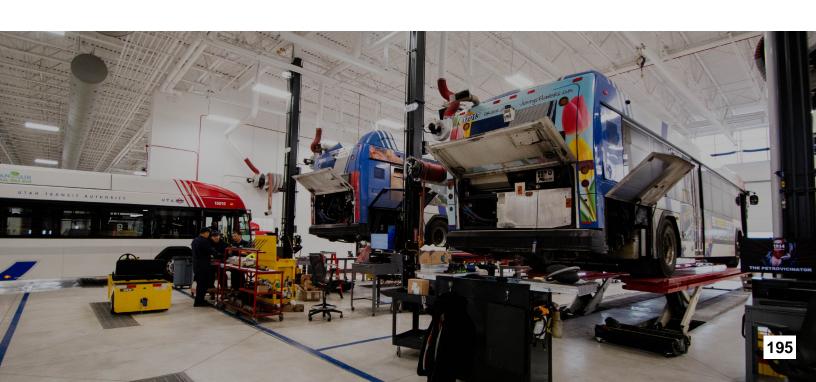
The annual capital planning process results in a selection of projects for the upcoming fiscal year capital budget and a forward-looking five-year capital plan. In general, the projects incorporated into the capital plan must reflect UTA's Strategic Plan and regional transit initiatives.

#### **PROJECT REQUESTS**

Project development was performed this year using a base budget approach where the capital budget development team met with project managers on an individual basis to understand their projects, their current status, and future financial needs. Only currently active projects were used during this initial base budget approach. Once this was complete, additional project requests could be submitted. These additional project requests were required for new projects or for existing projects where a core piece of the existing project may have changed.

New project requests were submitted for funding consideration. Proposed projects should meet a specific objective such as a mobility need or a State of Good Repair need or requirement and should be consistent with UTA's overall Strategic Plan and goals.

Project requests must include the overall project costs, the yearly budget needs for the project development, and the long-term operating and maintenance costs, including State of Good Repair costs if applicable. Potential funding sources are also identified in the project request.



Completed project requests are compiled, prioritized, and discussed by Executives based on UTA's Strategic Goals and Objectives outlined below. The Executive team reviews each request and weighs it against these agency priorities. Projects with lower priority may be reduced in scope or deferred to future years as needed. Once the project list is finalized, a draft five-year plan is submitted to the Executive team for review. Requests are trimmed as necessary to align with anticipated five-year funding resources, which are based on committed or reasonably foreseeable funding sources.

## **Previous Five-Year Plan Alignment**

Projects are evaluated based on how well they continue or build upon priorities established in the prior 2025-2029 Five-Year Capital Plan, ensuring continuity and consistency in long-term planning.



## **Legal and Safety Requirements**

Priority is given to projects that address regulatory compliance or critical safety needs, aligning with UTA's responsibility to provide a secure and legally sound transit system.



## **Delivery Potential**

Projects are assessed for their feasibility, readiness, and ability to be implemented within the five-year window, maximizing the effective use of available resources.

# **Meadowbrook Bus Charging Infrastructure**

UTA is adding 10 electric bus charging stations at the Meadowbrook Service Center, which will be used for the opening of the all-electric MVX BRT route in 2026.

As a part of the Innovative Mobility program in UTA's 10-Year Capital Plan, the Meadowbrook Bus Charging Infrastructure project provides critical infrastructure to promote the electrification of UTA's current bus fleet. Bus electrification reduces emissions of pollutants like nitrogen oxides (NOx) and particulate matter (PM) improving air quality, while serving disadvantaged communities within Salt Lake County.

# **Davis-Salt Lake City Community Connector**

UTA proposes to implement a 26-mile bus rapid transit project to connect communities in southern Davis County to northern Salt Lake County.

The new route will include 18 stations, transit signal priority, an end-of-line facility with electric bus charging infrastructure and operator amenities, and 18 battery electric buses. Building on the success of Routes 455 and 470, the Davis-Salt Lake City Community Connector will revitalize neighborhoods through better access to employment, entertainment, and recreation hubs. This project improves mobility within the corridor, aligning with broader transportation plans for the area.

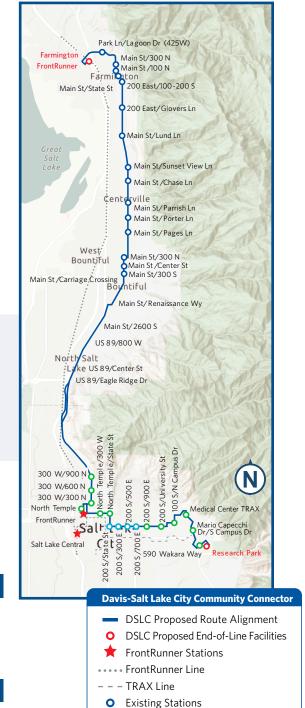

## **Bus Stop Program**

As part of UTA Capital Plan's Customer Experience projects, UTA is beginning work to implement bus stop improvements at select stops across our service area.

The purpose of these improvements is to make stops accessible to all riders, including people with limited mobility. Enhancements will vary by location but typically include replacement of sidewalk panels and new concrete pads with the addition of shelters, benches, trash cans, bike racks, and lighting. Through bus stop improvements, UTA is investing in improving the riding experience systemwide, aligning with its Five-Year Service Plan.

## **FrontRunner 2X**

UTA and UDOT are expanding commuter rail service along the Wasatch Front to increase capacity and meet the growing transit demands.

This project will implement double tracking in 11 strategic locations, add one new station, realign track in one location, and add 10 new train sets along the FrontRunner line. These upgrades will cut wait times in half, and by 2050, travel times for FrontRunner are expected to outperform I-15 travel times. FrontRunner 2X is one of many projects in UTA's 10-Year Capital Plan to expand public transportation throughout its service area.

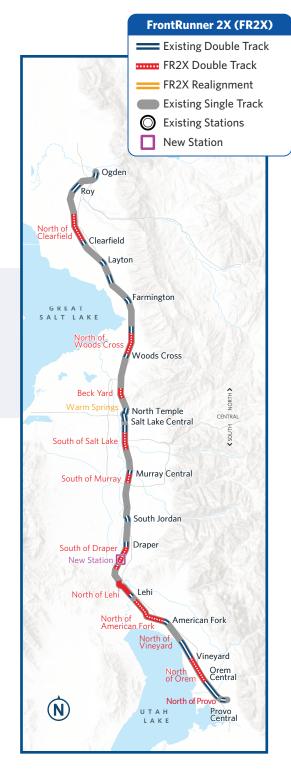

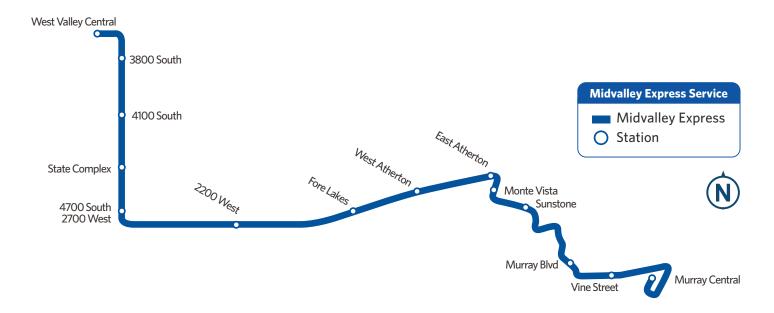
## **MVX BRT**

UTA is developing the Midvalley Express (MVX), a bus rapid transit (BRT) route that will enhance east-west connection across communities in Murray, Taylorsville, and West Valley City.

The route is currently under construction and will be the third BRT route in UTA's system. The route will feature a designated bus lane on 4500/4700 South from Atherton Drive to Redwood Road, new sheltered bus stops, a fleet of 10 new electric buses, and 15-minute service. MVX will improve transit accessibility and frequency, connecting riders to their local destinations.

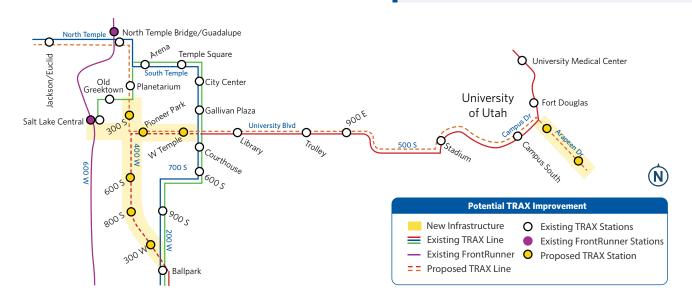
# **TRAX Orange Line Implementation and Red Line Realignment**

Based on the 2025 Techlink TRAX Study, UTA is planning a realignment of the TRAX Red Line through the Granary District and the development of a new Orange Line connecting the University of Utah Research Park to Salt Lake City International Airport.

The new proposal was developed based on community input, environmental considerations, and the need to maximize operational efficiency, among other factors. The proposed projects would improve connectivity between economically vital areas and provide more transit options to westside residents.

# 5600 West Bus Route (West Salt Lake County)

UTA, in partnership with UDOT, has initiated an expansion of bus service in the west side of Salt Lake County, covering the cities of Salt Lake, West Valley, West Jordan, and Kearns.

The state population is projected to double by 2050, with current and future growth occurring on the west side of the county. This project is the selected transit alternative for UDOT's Mountain View Corridor project and has been identified in the UTA Five-Year Service Plan to address the future growth of west Salt Lake County.

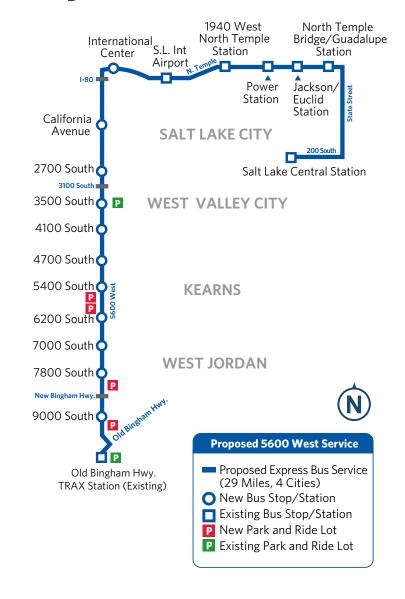

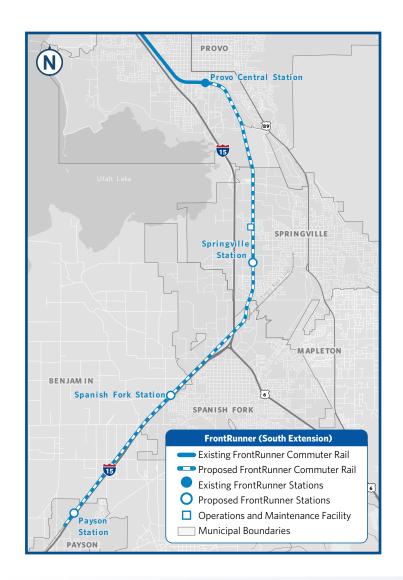
## **FrontRunner South Extension**

**UTA** is planning to extend FrontRunner commuter rail service from Provo to Payson, including new stations proposed in Springville and Spanish Fork.

This extension was identified in the South Valley Transit Study completed in 2022 and aims to improve regional connectivity in southern Utah County. The current phase of the project includes environmental review under the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) and preliminary design. While there is currently no funding or timeline for final design, this project represents a key step toward expanding commuter rail access to growing communities along the Wasatch Front.

# **Maintenance of Way Training Facilities**

This project will remodel an existing facility to establish the Transit Technical Education Center (TTEC), a centralized hub for all UTA apprenticeship programs.

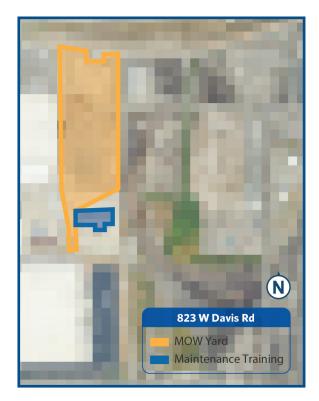
TTEC will support training in Bus, Light Rail, Commuter Rail, Maintenance of Way, Facilities, HVAC, and Body Shop apprenticeship. The remodeled building will include four modern classrooms, three full-size bus bays, and an external classroom. An adjacent Maintenance of Way (MOW) training yard will replicate real-world UTA rail conditions, providing a safe, purpose-built environment for developing safety-sensitive competencies. TTEC will ensure apprentices and students receive consistent, immersive, and high-quality training that prepares them for success in their chosen field.

#### **GOALS**

- Create a dedicated, centralized training facility that supports the current and future needs of UTA's apprenticeship programs across all maintenance disciplines
- Provide a safe, hands-on learning environment that mirrors real-world transit operations, including rail alignment and vehicle systems
- Equip the facility with state-of-the-art tools, training modules, and instructional spaces to enable vendor, technical, and regulatory compliance training

# **Utah County Park & Ride (Eagle Mountain and Saratoga Springs)**

UTA is designing two park and ride lots in Utah County: one in Eagle Mountain and one in Saratoga Springs.

Positioned along the 860 bus route, these two park and ride lots provide enhanced access to residents in the area to connect to the FrontRunner commuter rail service. These park and ride lots are expected to be completed in summer of 2025 (Eagle Mountain) and spring of 2026 (Saratoga Springs).

# TRAX Forward Program

# TRAX Forward is a unified term that encompasses UTA's ongoing TRAX improvements and modernization projects.

This multi-project effort incorporates a realignment of the TRAX Red Line, the targeted creation of a TRAX Orange Line, the expansion of late night and early morning service, an extension of the S-Line streetcar, light rail fleet rehabilitation and replacement, platform improvements (including ADA accessibility measures), safety infrastructure upgrades, and train-to-train communication systems replacements. As the Salt Lake Valley continues to grow and evolve, TRAX Forward provides a vision for sustainable, desirable, and efficient light rail transportation options that meet community needs.

#### **GOALS**

- Adapt UTA's light rail system to evolving travel patterns and technological progressions
- Combat wear and tear from extreme summer and winter weather to ensure greater reliability, safety, and efficiency year-round
- Enhance the interface between light rail and other modes of transportation, ensuring a seamless travel experience for all

# **Bus Procurement and Replacement Program**

UTA is undertaking a comprehensive, ongoing initiative to modernize its public transit fleet, including both standard buses and on-demand paratransit vehicles.

Each year, a set number of aging buses are retired and replaced with newer, more efficient models to ensure that transit services remain reliable, safe, environmentally responsible, and comfortable for passengers. As part of this broader effort, the Paratransit Vehicle Replacement Project focuses on enhancing accessibility and the rider experience for individuals who rely on specialized transit services. This project introduces modern, low-floor paratransit vehicles that eliminate the need for traditional lifts, making boarding faster, safer, and more convenient for passengers with mobility challenges.

#### **GOALS**

- Reinforce UTA's commitment to providing inclusive and accessible transportation for all riders
- Modernize vehicles, reducing maintenance costs, improving fuel efficiency, and increasing safety
- Transition to low-floor vehicles to improve accessibility and convenience for riders
- Incorporate emissions control technologies to reduce the environmental impacts of UTA vehicles

## **Light Rail Vehicle Replacement**

UTA's TRAX system has operated Siemens SD100 and SD160 light rail vehicles (LRV) since 1999 and 2001, respectively, but is now overhauling and replacing them with new Stadler CITYLINK light rail trainsets.

The SD100 and SD160 LRVs had high floors, requiring passengers to climb steep steps or use long switchback wheelchair ramps in order to enter. The new vehicles feature low-floor boarding, while also being compatible with existing track and station infrastructure. By eliminating the need for steps and ramps, the new LRVs make boarding safer, faster, and more inclusive. These efforts help advance UTA's goals of comfort, reliability, and accessibility for all passengers.

- Improve accessibility by eliminating high block loading platforms, enabling operation of new/existing fleet
- Ensure safety of TRAX passengers by replacing critical vehicle components
- Provide a comfortable and reliable experience for all riders

## **FrontRunner Vehicle Rehabilitation**

In order to support the transit needs of rapidly expanding communities along the Wasatch Front, UTA is overhauling its FrontRunner commuter rail vehicles.

This project will overhaul the interior and mechanical components of UTA's 38 bi-level passenger cars and 18 locomotives, upgrading aging parts with improved components. The overhauled trains will ensure passenger comfort, accessibility, reliability, and safety

#### **GOALS**

- Reduce train maintenance and fuel costs by replacing aging vehicles with modern alternatives
- **Improve reliability** through avoiding maintenance-related delays
- **Enhance passenger comfort** with new interior train designs

## **Fare System Replacement**

UTA Fares Systems Replacement Program aims to simplify payment for all riders by updating existing hardware used to validate transit fares.

This project will also streamline and integrate all independent fare systems into one intuitive and innovative platform. Ticket vending machines are already installed, while ticket validators will be operational by the end of 2025, and planning for future features, such as open payment and mobile fare options, is currently in early stages.

# **Next Steps**



As UTA looks ahead, continued collaboration with state and regional partners will be essential to advancing major transit investments. A key focus of the next phase is implementing House Bill 322, passed in 2022 by the Utah State Legislature, which designated UDOT as the lead agency for delivering fixed guideway projects receiving state funding.



#### **UTA/UDOT COORDINATION**

**House Bill 322 (2022)**, titled Public Transit Capital Development Modifications, formalizes the partnership between UDOT and UTA, strengthens coordination efforts, and provides dedicated state funding to support major transit investments across the region. These state funds can also be used to leverage additional grant funding.

The following projects represent current UDOT and UTA partnerships established under House Bill 322:



#### FrontRunner 2X

Double tracking of UTA's FrontRunner system to increase overall capacity and frequency of this service



#### **Point of the Mountain Improvements**

Tied to FrontRunner 2X; includes a new station and double tracking in the Bluffdale area



#### **S-Line Extension**

Extension of the S-Line streetcar line going up to Highland Drive



#### Midvalley Connector (Midvalley Express, MVX BRT)

Bus rapid transit route going from Murray Central Station to West Valley Central Station



#### FrontRunner South Extension

Early efforts relating to a FrontRunner extension going from Provo to Payson



#### **Sharp/Tintic Rail Corridor Connection**

Connection between two existing rail corridors that would facilitate a future FrontRunner extension from Provo to Payson

Future light rail system improvements around the downtown Salt Lake City and University of Utah area



The recent passage of **Senate Bill 174 (2025)**, titled Transit and Transportation Governance Amendments, further strengthens the coordination between UDOT, UTA, and other stakeholders in the development of transit projects.

This bill expands UDOT's oversight over fixed guideway projects, specifically ensuring that UDOT is the lead agency for projects that receive state funding. Under this new legislation, UDOT will not only oversee project delivery but also be responsible for the planning, design, and construction of major transit projects, ensuring they align with state transportation priorities.

The funding allocated through Senate Bill 174 will support a variety of fixed guideway transit projects, including the extension of light rail systems, development of bus rapid transit (BRT) corridors, and the creation of new commuter rail lines. It also enables the construction of new transit stations, modernization of existing infrastructure, and improvements to key transit hubs.

This funding is designed to facilitate the growth of the regional transit network, expanding service to underserved areas, reducing congestion, and improving overall connectivity. Additionally, projects supported by the bill will prioritize sustainability through eco-friendly technologies, such as electric buses and energy-efficient transit systems.

#### **PROJECT KEY:**

UTA's Five-Year Capital Plan consists of a list of projects over the next five years that UTA plans to execute on. The typical project is identified by a six-digit grouping of letters and numbers to make up the unique project code. The letters are tied to the type of project being referenced and a general description of those letter groupings is provided below. The grouping of numbers represents a numerical value used provide a unique number so these projects can be easily tracked. The main project groupings are as follows:

- FMA Projects: Facilities, public safety, and security projects
- ICI Projects: Information Technology projects
- MSP Projects: General capital projects
- **REV Projects:** Vehicles purchases or repairs
- **SGR Projects:** State of Good Repair projects. Projects used for major rehabilitation or replacements of existing assets.

#### **BACKGROUND:**

UTA's Customer Experience team leads agencywide efforts to enhance customer information, signage, and bus stop amenities across the UTA network. With over 5,000 bus stops, 52 Light Rail stations, 7 Streetcar stations, 16 Commuter Rail stations, and 32 Bus Rapid Transit stations, ongoing improvement initiatives are essential to maintaining a high-quality customer experience. These efforts directly support the UTA 2030 Strategic Plan priority of *Exceeding Customer Expectations*, which states: "UTA puts its customers first by providing an easy, enjoyable, and accessible transit experience where customers feel engaged, safe, and cared about."

UTA's Wayfinding Plan defines the types, quantities, and design standards needed to improve UTA's transit signage system. It outlines how to standardize and enhance existing signs, align them with international best practices, estimate realistic costs and materials, and guide the rollout and placement of new and updated signage across the network.
